The annual numbers for 2011 are presented for the Juvenile Detention Center (JDC), the Risk Assessment Instrument (RAI), Probation and BTT.

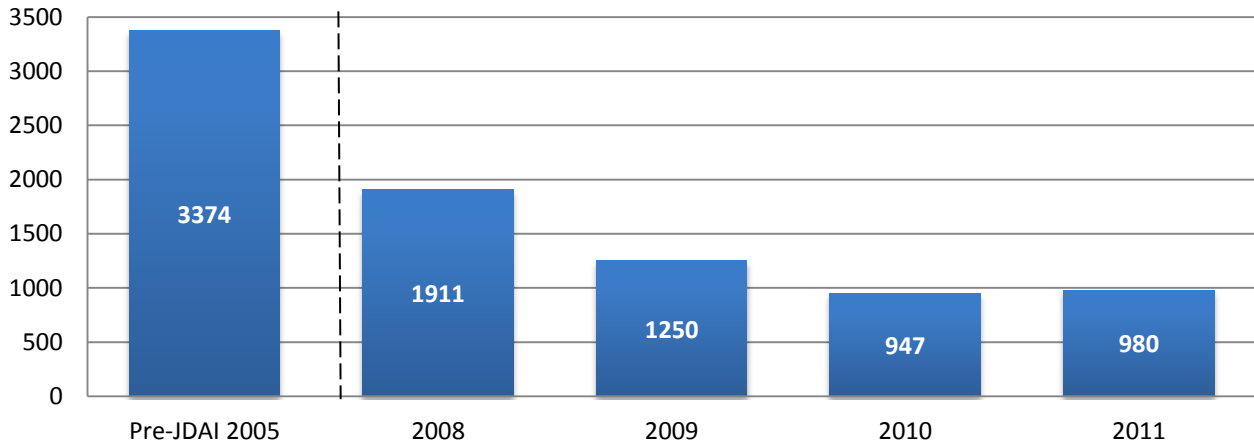

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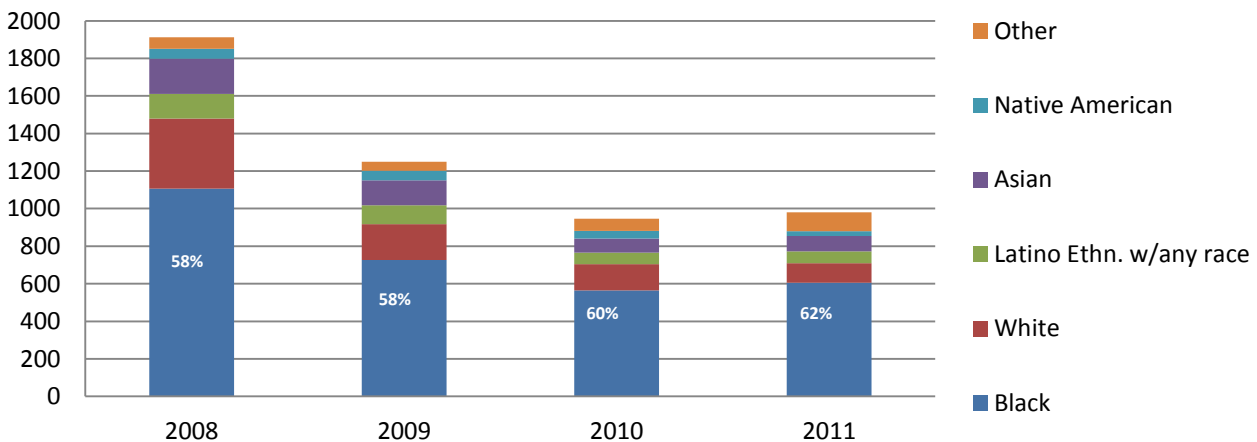

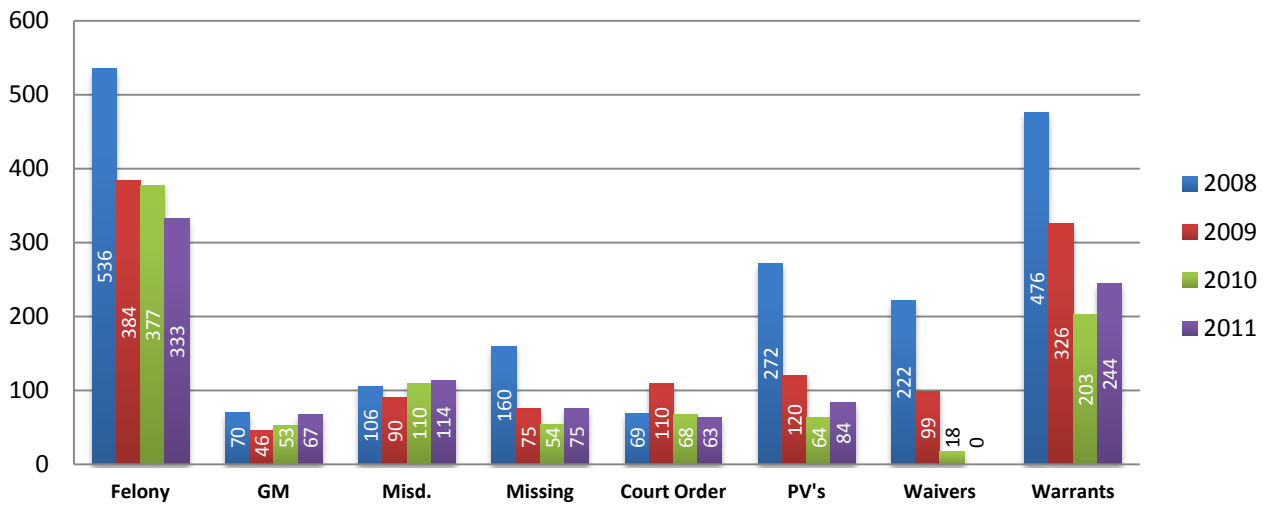

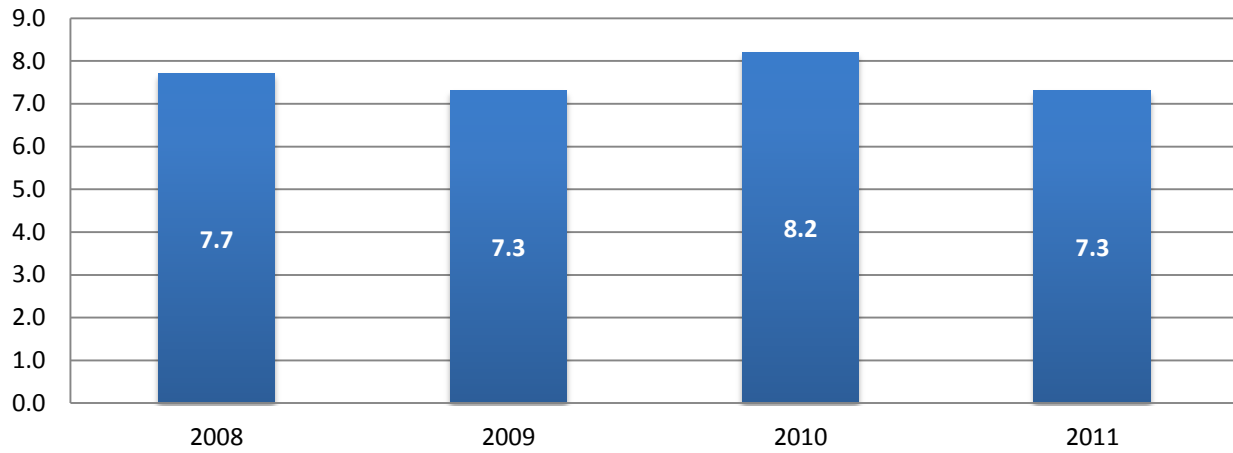

Average Length of Stay (ALOS)



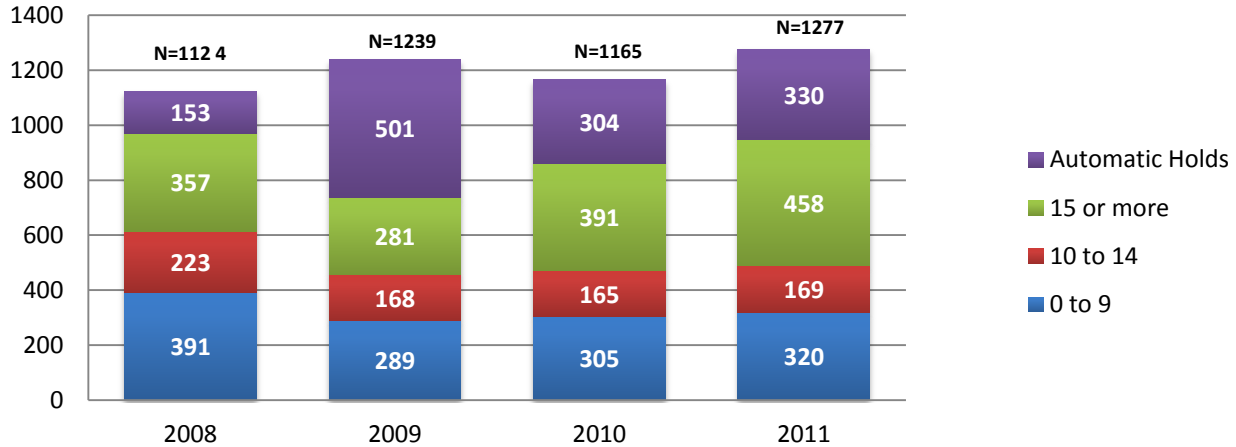

The Risk Assessment Instrument (RAI) is used as a decision-making tool to determine whether or not youth should be placed in the Juvenile Detention Center (JDC), released to an 36 Hour Alternative to Detention (ATD) or released into the custody and care of a parent/guardian with a court date.

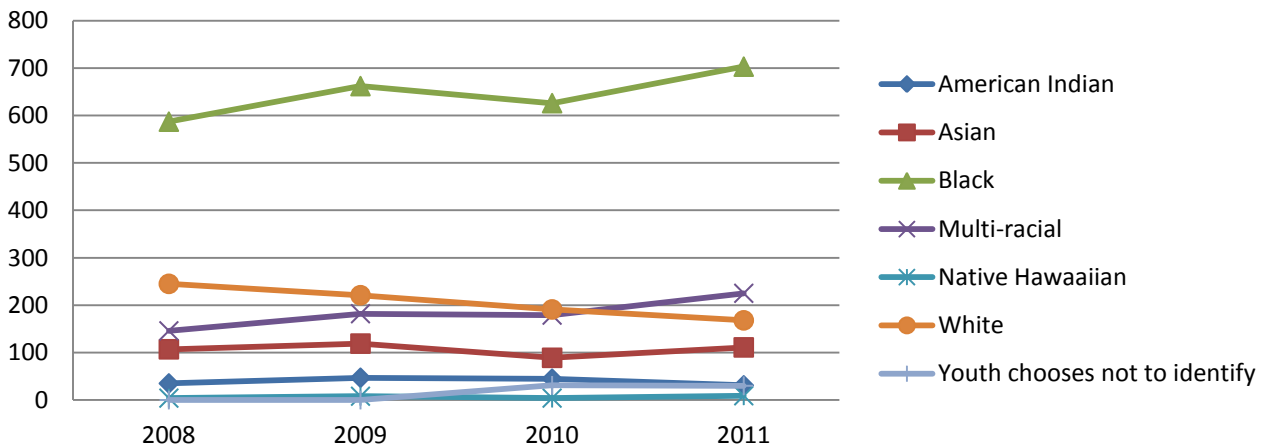
Youth RAI'd by Score



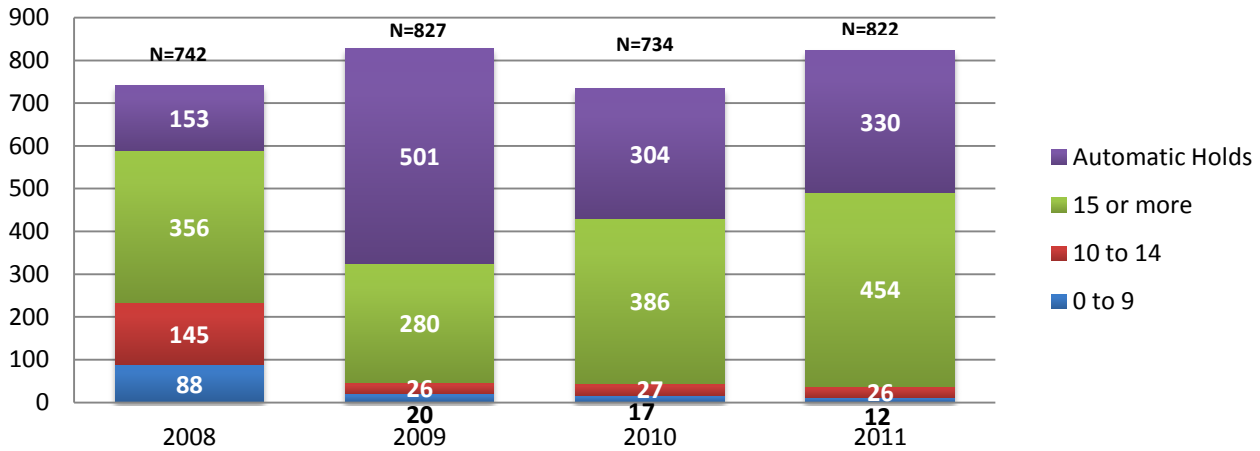

Youth Detained by Score



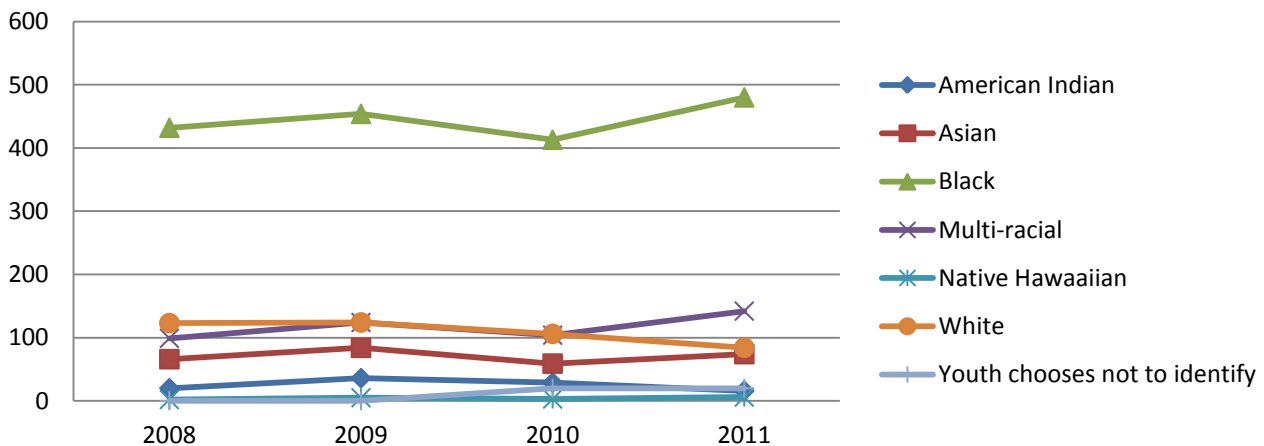

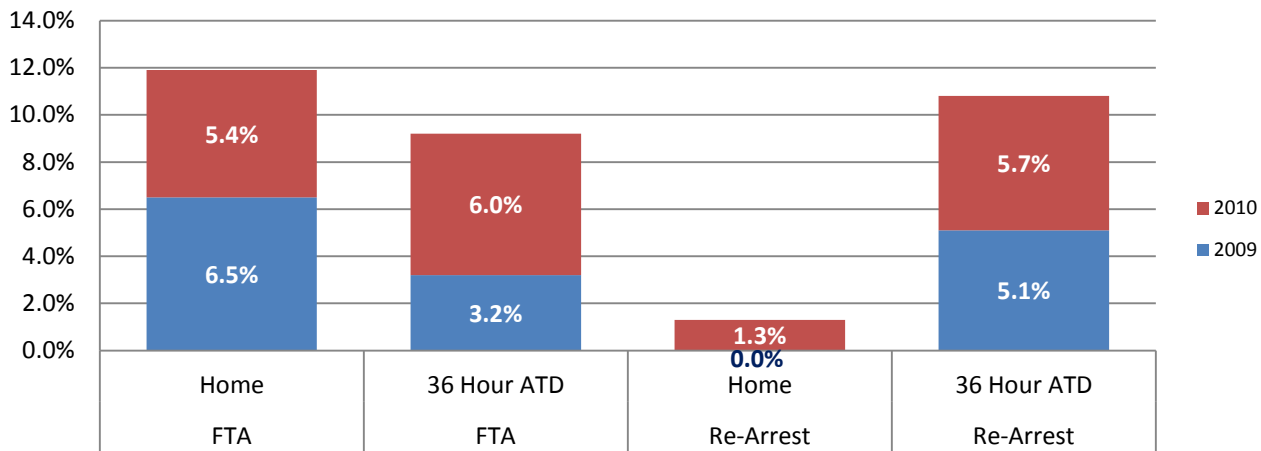

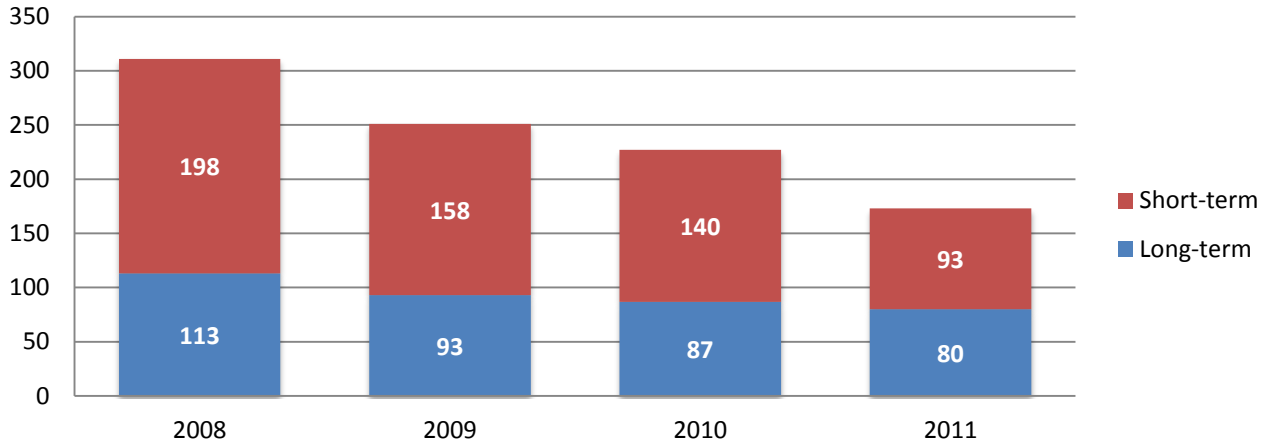

BTT Placements by Programs

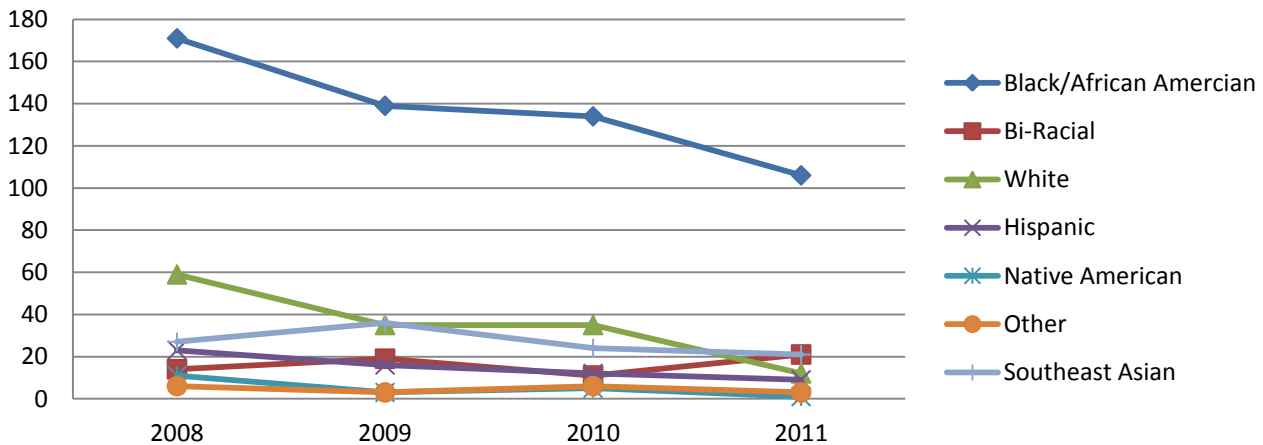


In March 2008, the Boys Work Program was moved from JDC to BTT and was renamed the Recovery Program. Tracking the Short-term Recovery Program allows comparison between the usage of the detention-based work program with the more recent residential-based Recovery Program.

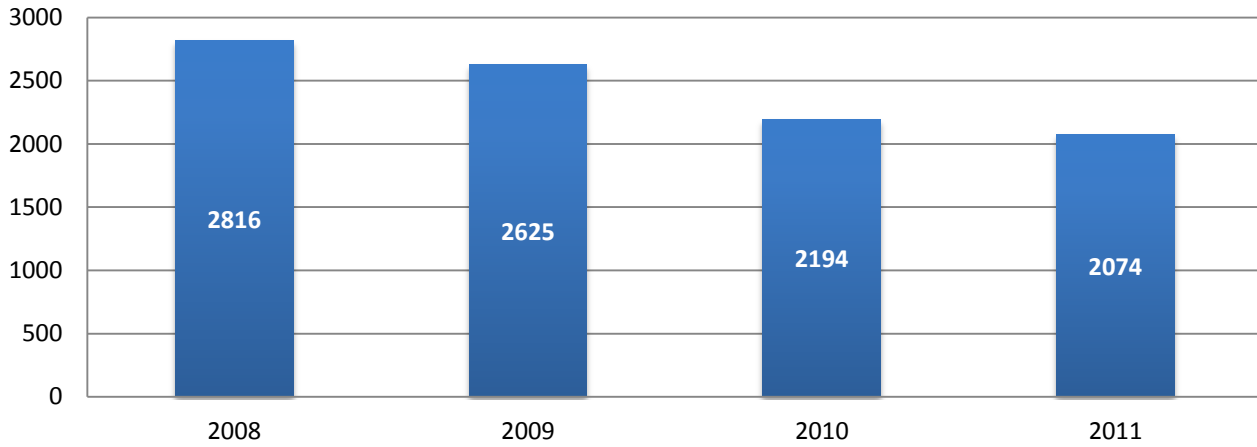
The Long-term (Residential) program consists of two lengths of stay: The Traditional Program (minimum of 4 months stay) and the Extended Length (minimum of 8 months stay) The Long-Term Program is broken into three sequential program Components; (1) Orientation; (2) BTT stay; and (3) Aftercare.

The Short-term (Recovery) program is a consequence program for boys. The Court determines which of the three work programs is most appropriate: 7-11 days*, 14-21 days or 30-45 days. *This program has been eliminated.

BTT Programs by Race



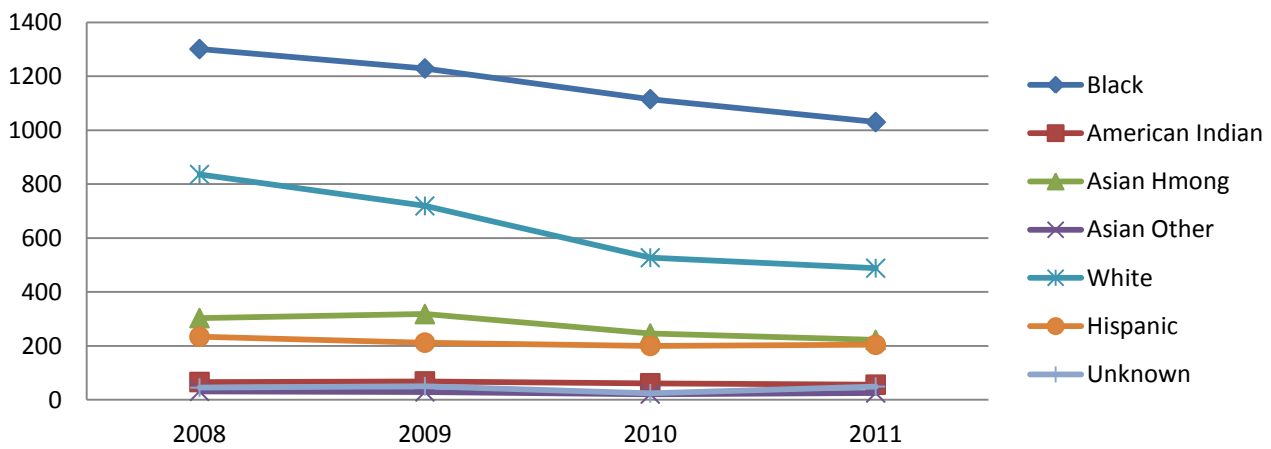
Number of Youth Served by Probation



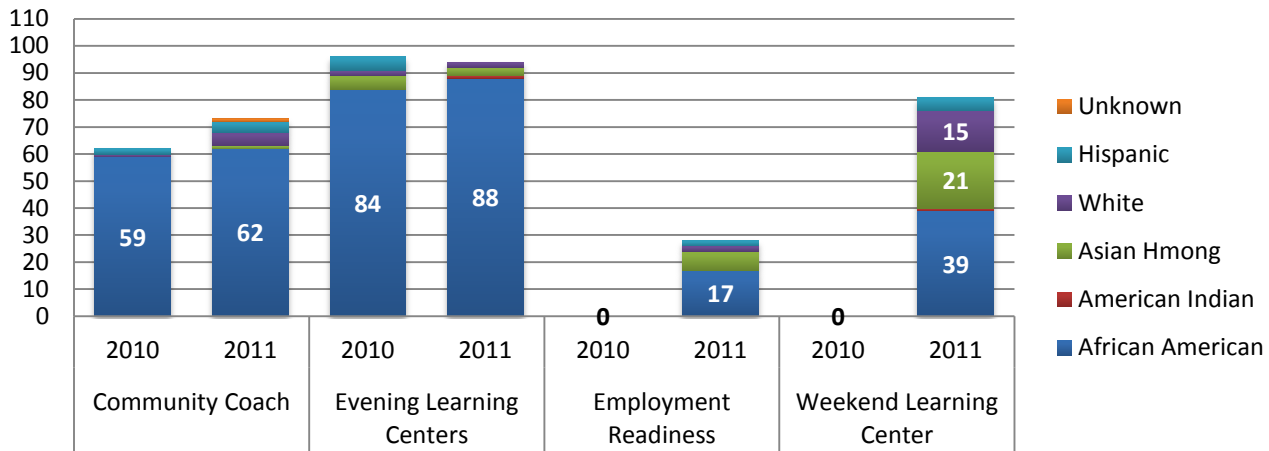

Community Based ATDs by Race



Community Coach: This intervention is a one-on-one support for youth struggling with compliance or needing to participate as a condition of their probation. The desired intervention will provide short-term, individualized support to these youth. Individuals will assist youth in problem solving, comply with probation requirements, and target objectives established by the youth's Probation Officer.

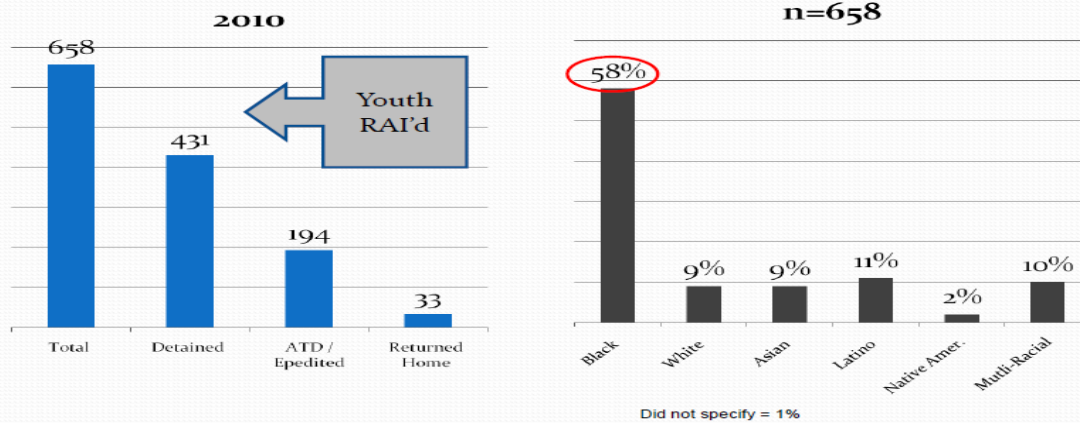
Evening Learning Center: This intervention provides structured, evidence-based programming during high risk time periods for youth as an alternative to placement at the Juvenile Detention Center.

Employment Readiness: Staff provide group based pre-employment/job readiness training, customer service certification, personal and life skills development, mentoring and subsidized work experience/internship opportunities for youth ages 16 and above to adolescents referred by Ramsey County Community Corrections.

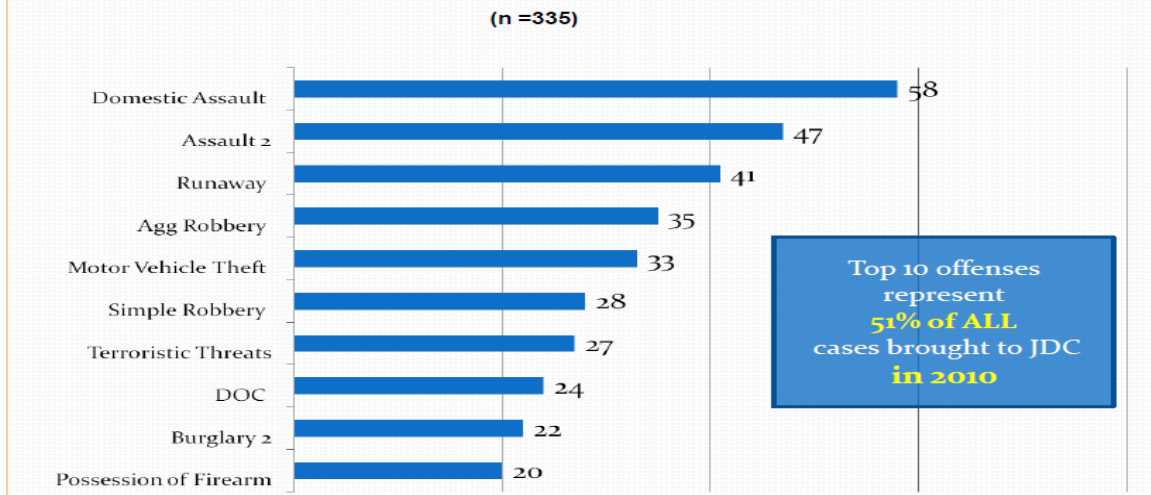
Weekend Learning Center: The weekend programming focuses on service learning options and opportunities for youth in their home communities. Service learning is an educational approach that integrates community service with instruction and reflection to enrich the learning experience, teach responsibility, and strengthen communities.

SPPD Cases Referred to JDC

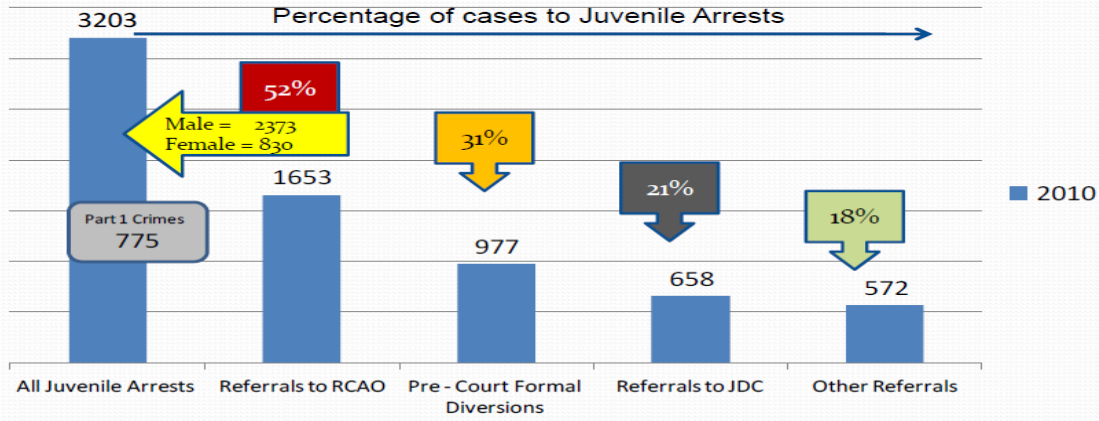


Top 10 Offenses Referred to JDC by SPPD

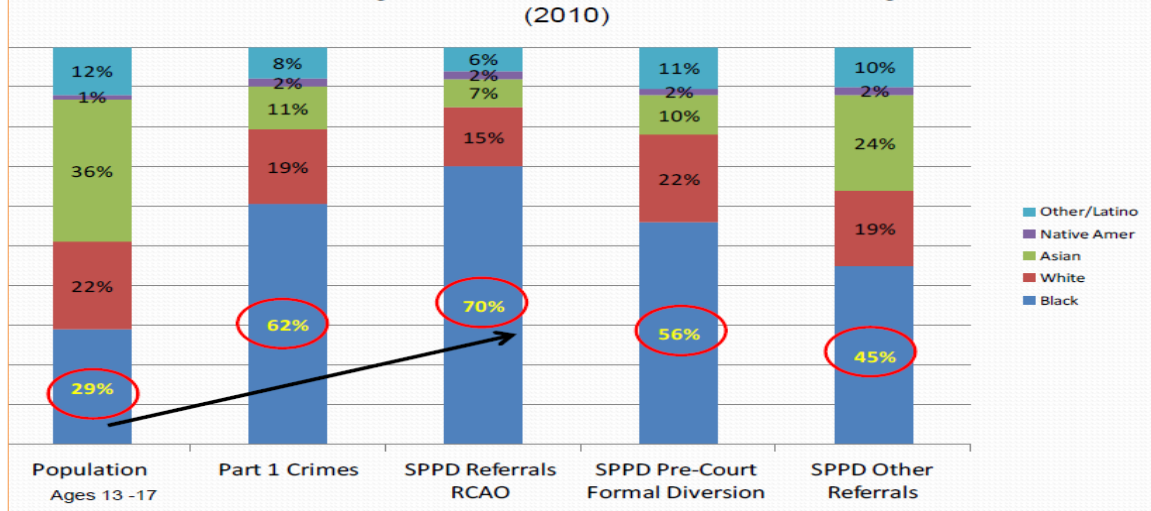

SPPD Statistics by Key Decision Points

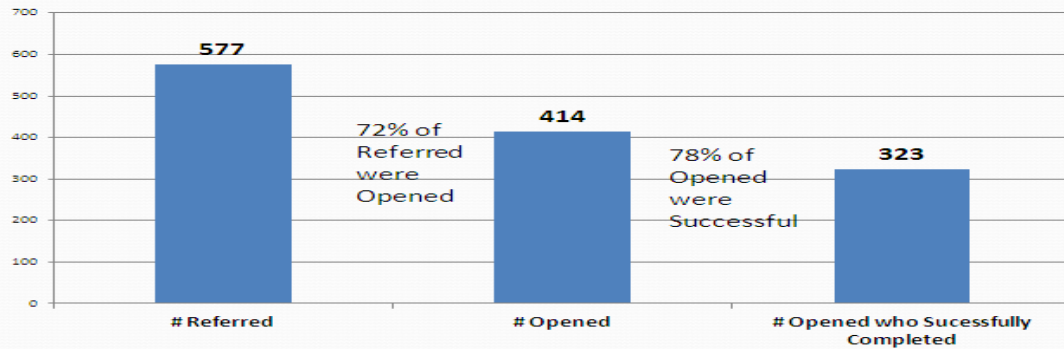


Youth at Key Decision Points by Race (2010)

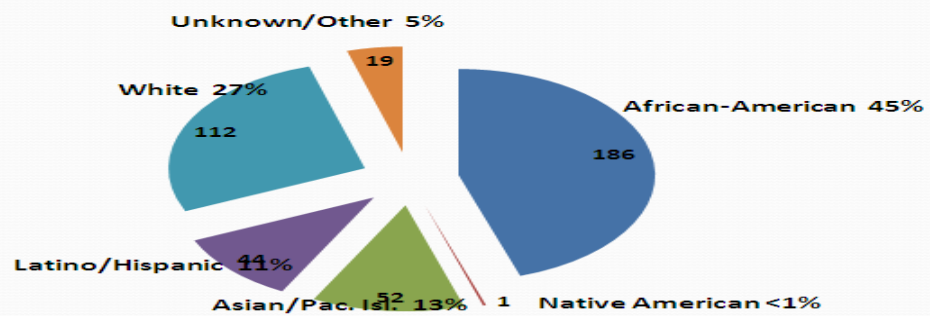

2010 Diversion Referrals

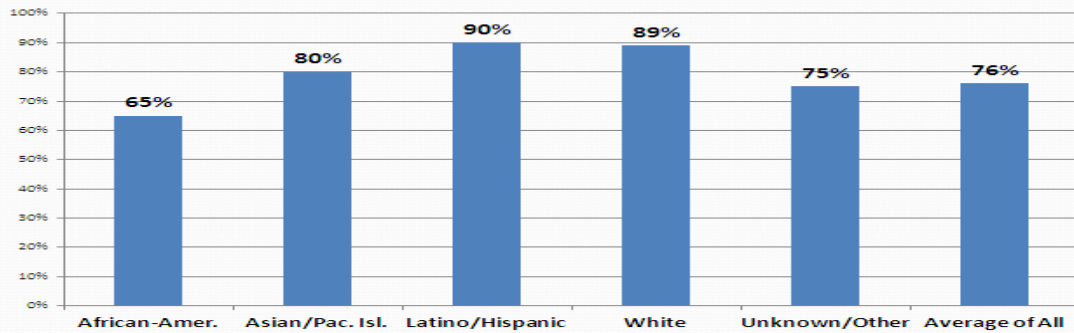


Racial Makeup of Clients who Opened
