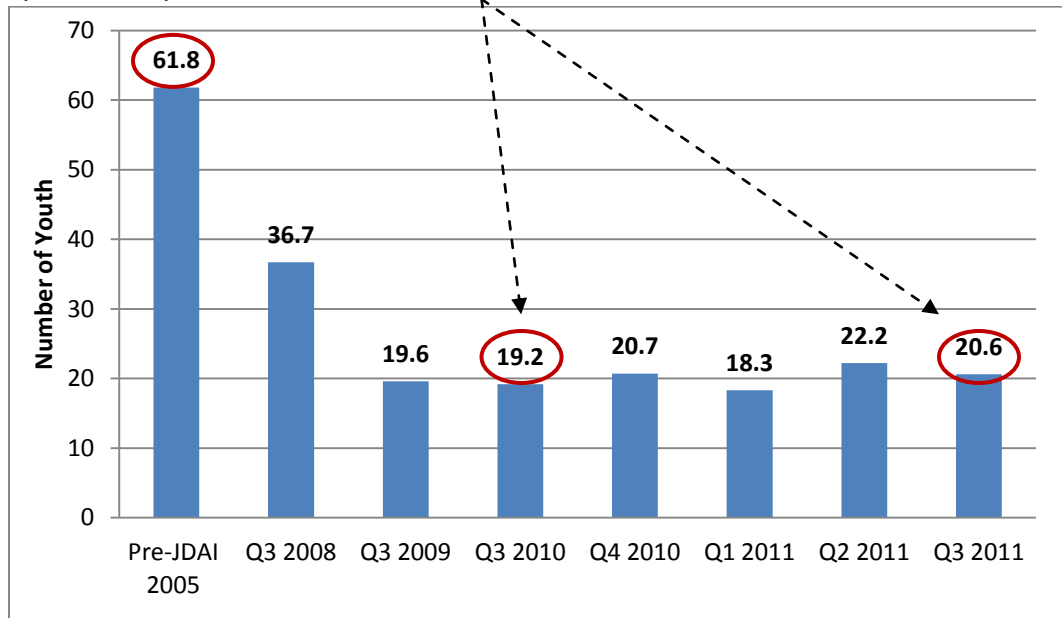

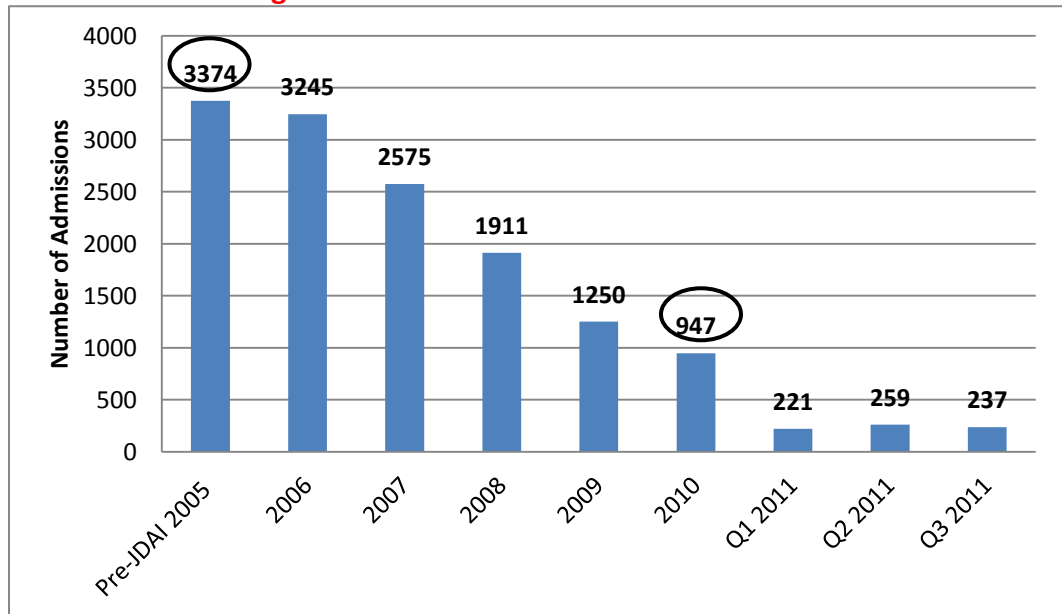

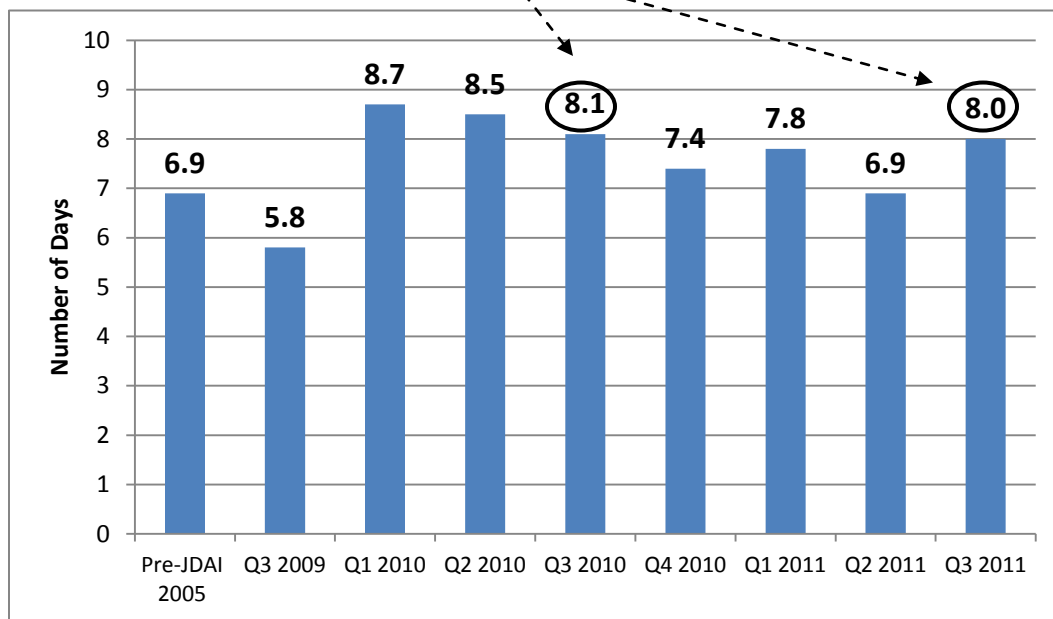
Average Length of Stay in Detention, Number of Days

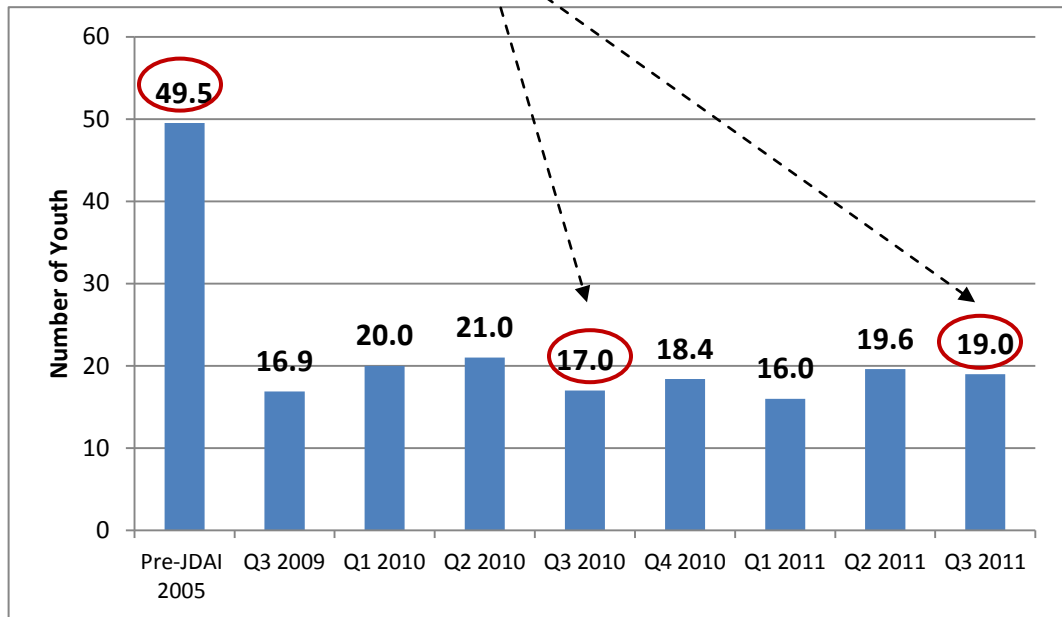

Average Daily Population of Youth of Color in Detention (for Detention Status Juveniles only).



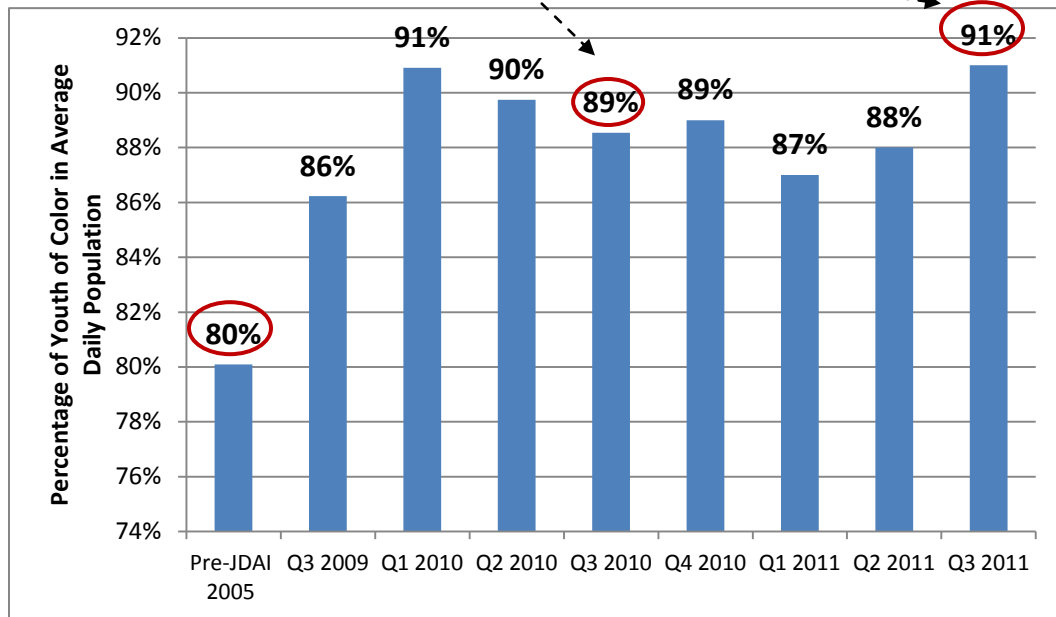
Youth of Color as a Percentage of ADP in Detention,

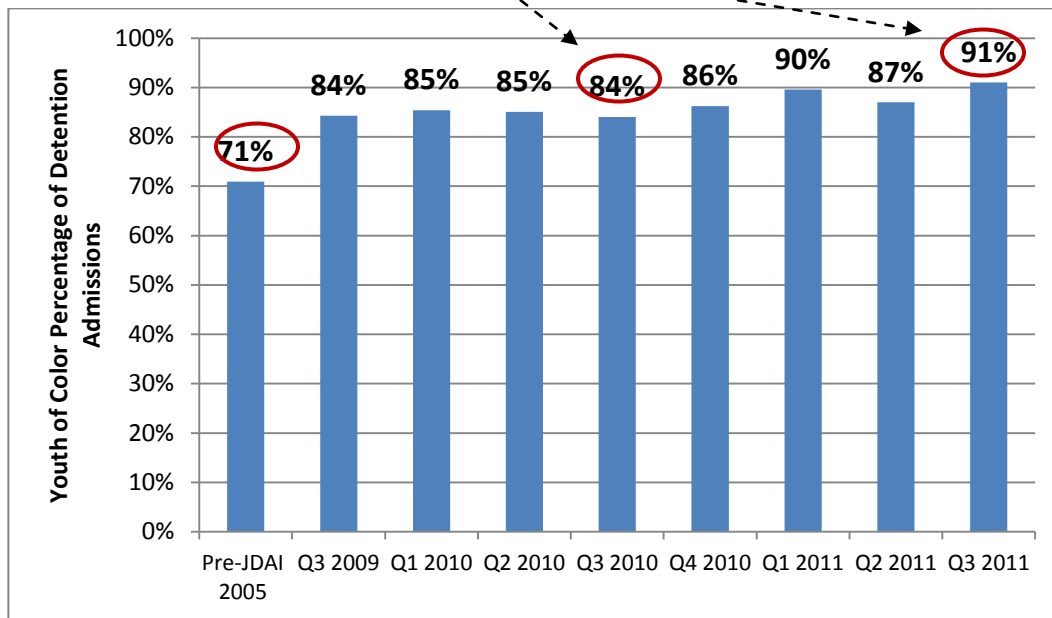
Youth of Color Percentage of Detention Admissions,

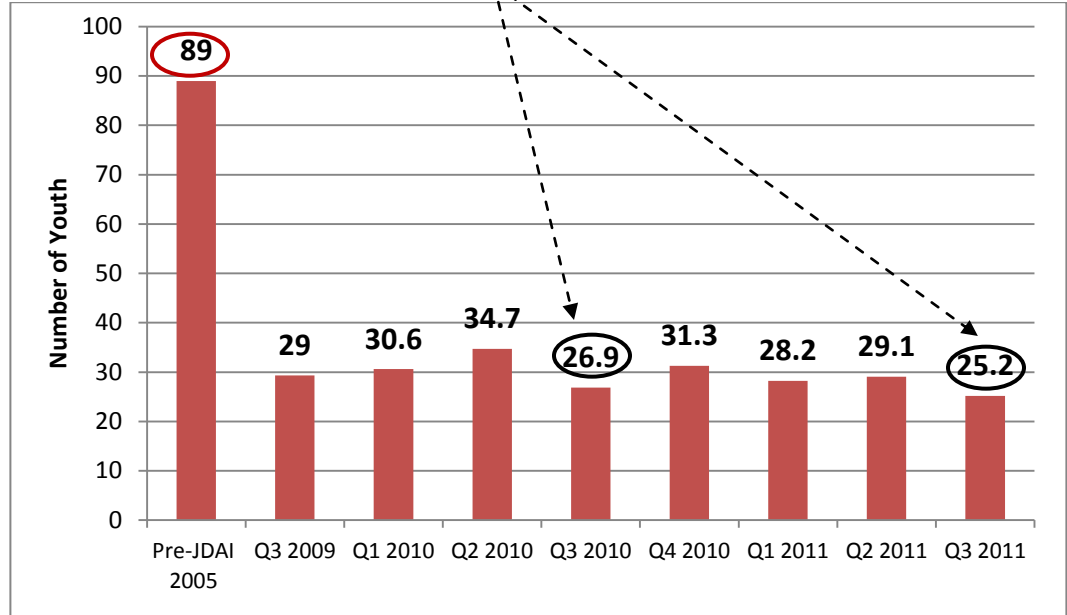

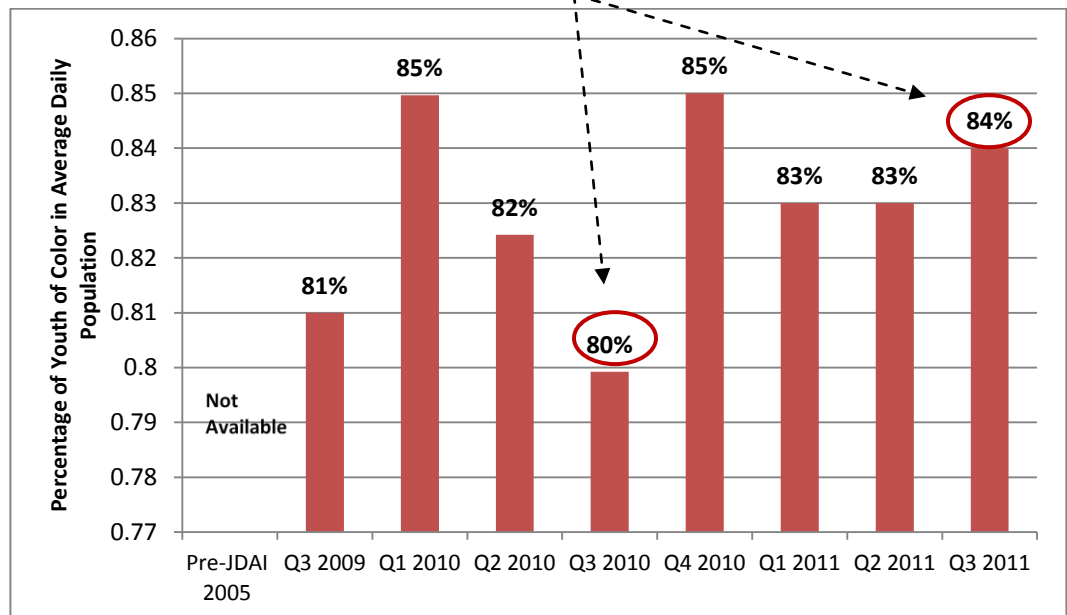


Youth of Color as a Percentage of Average Daily Population in JDC Facility

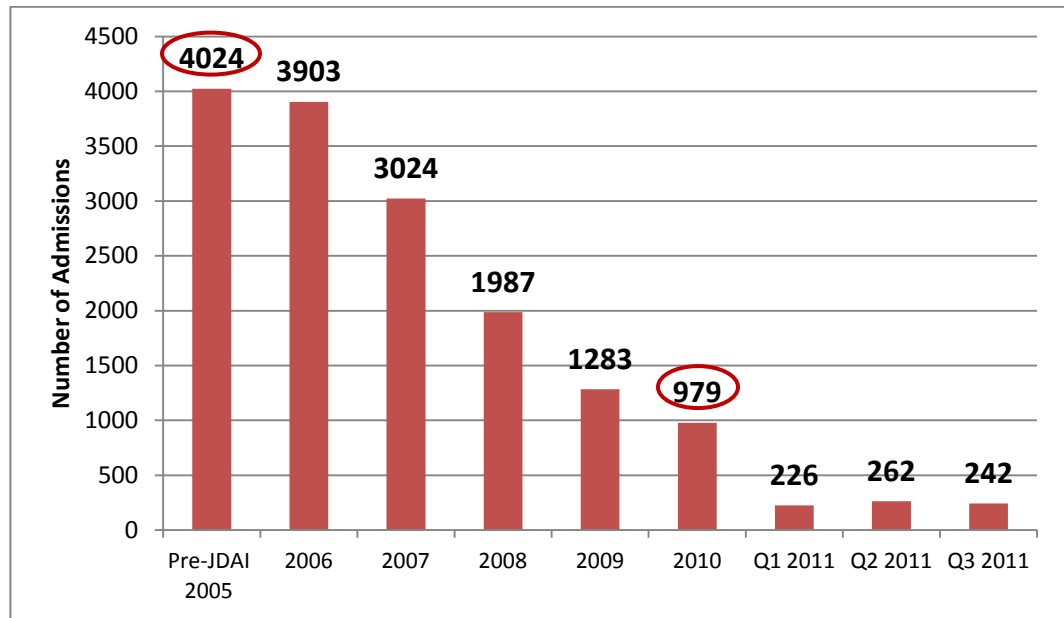


Annual Admissions to JDC Facility

An admission into Detention immediately followed by an admission into the Work Program or QUEST Program is counted as two admissions.

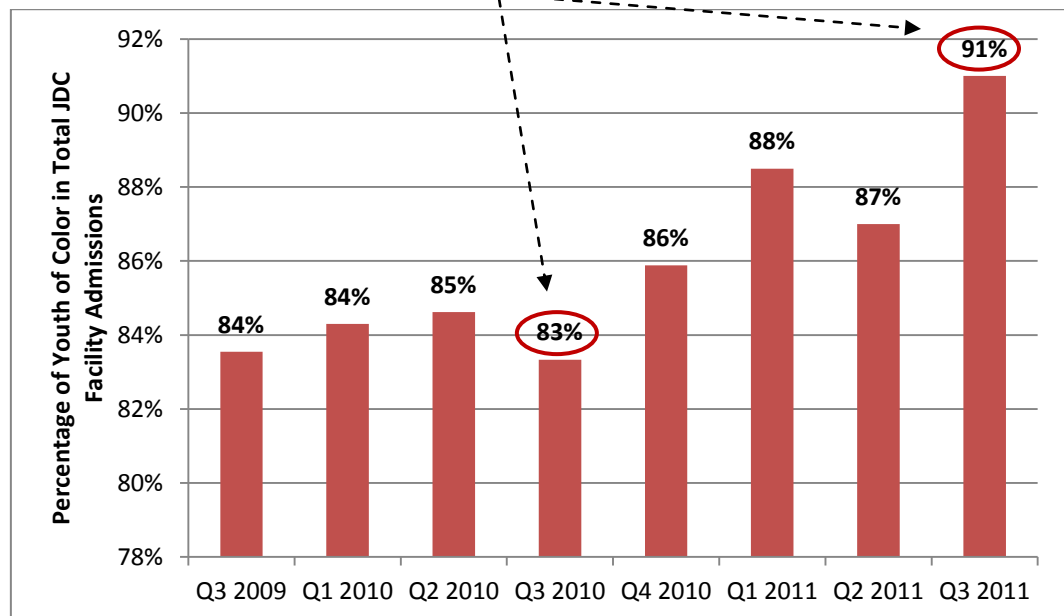


Youth of Color Percentage of JDC Facility Admissions

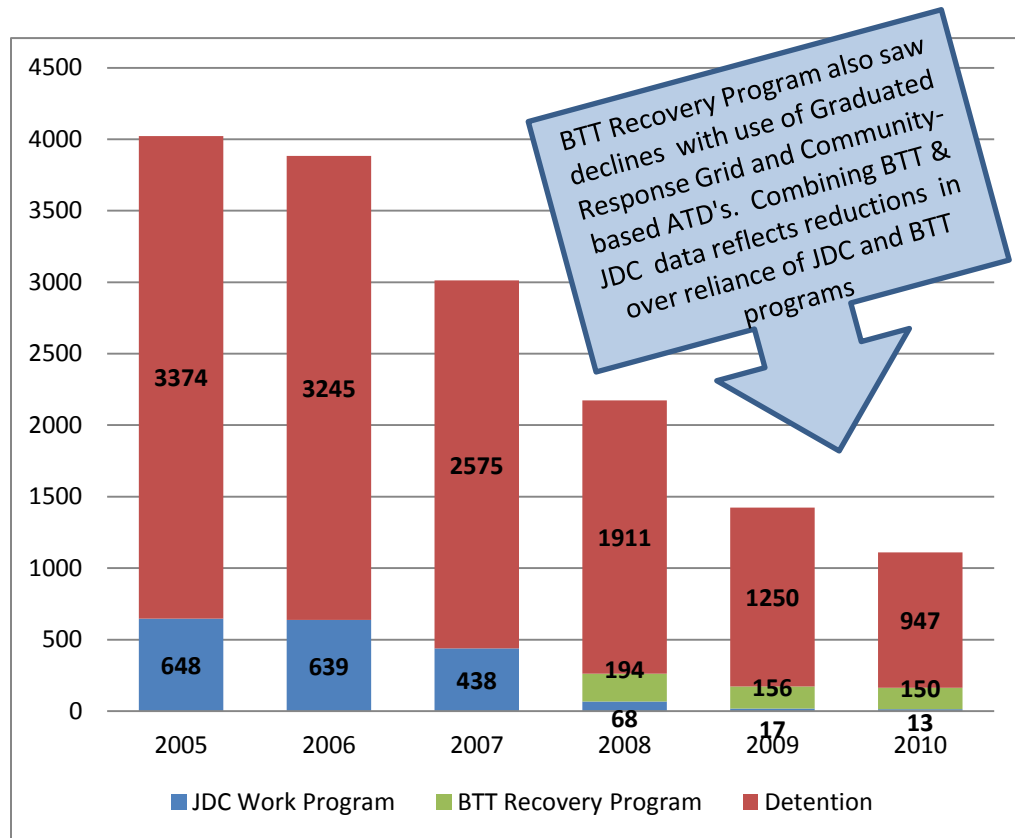

Program Admissions, 2005 - 2010

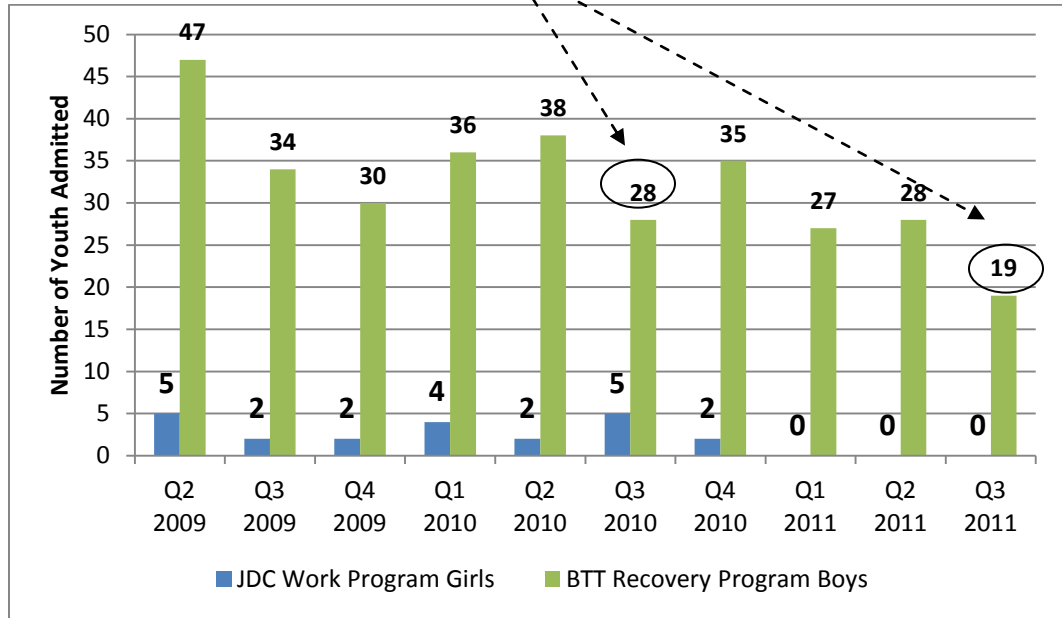

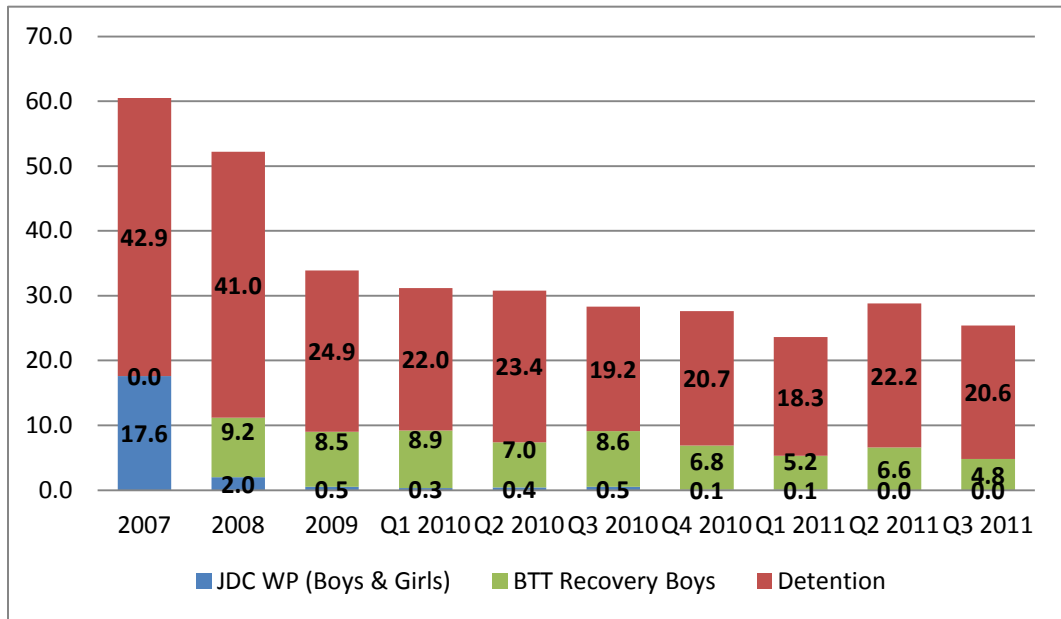
Admissions by Program, Q2 2009 – Q3 2011

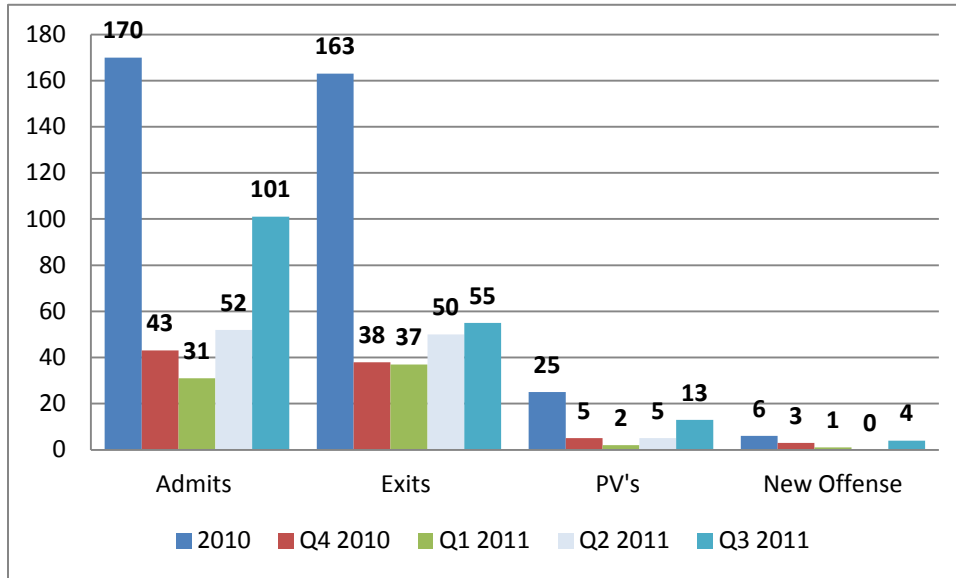

Community Based Alternatives to Detention, 2010 – Q3 2011



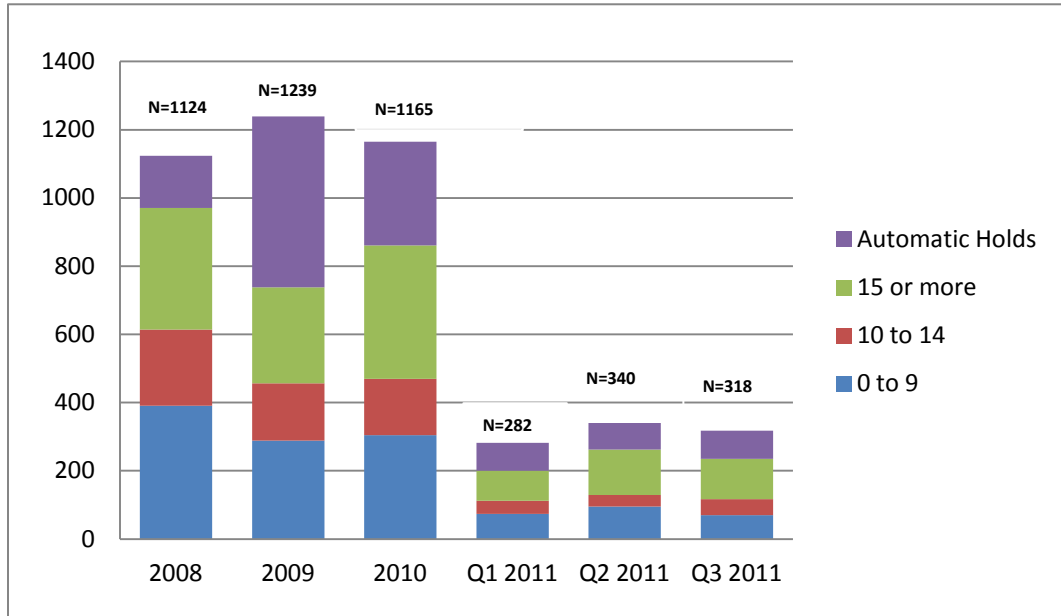
*In June 2009, Evening Learning Centers (ELC) and Community Coaches (CC) were implemented for pre and post disposition.

*In July 2011, Weekend Learning Center (WLC) was implemented.

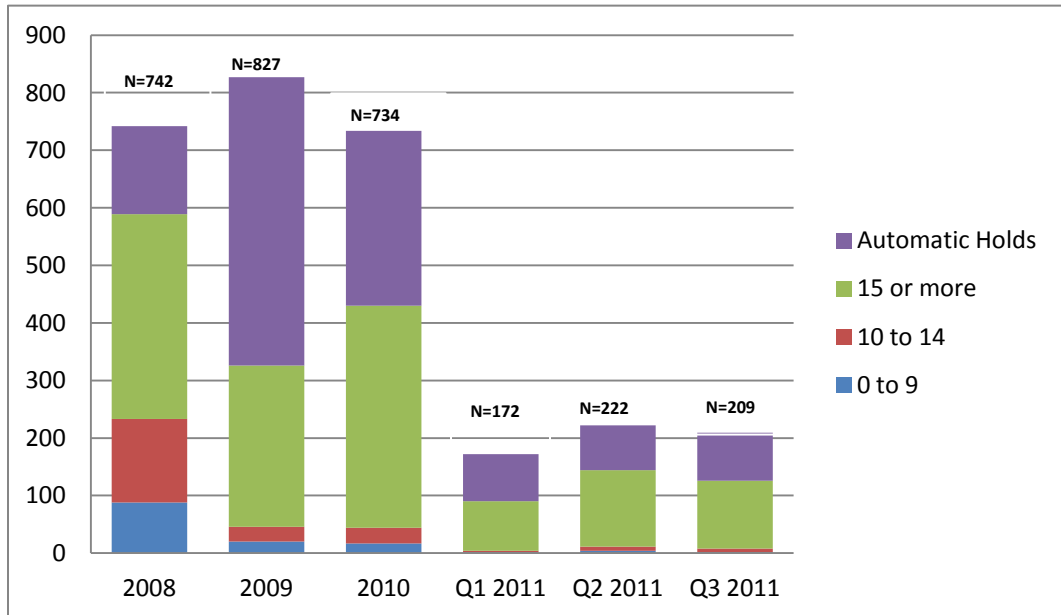
RAI Data: 2008 – Q3 2011 - Youth RAI'd by Score

The Risk Assessment Instrument (RAI) is used as a decision-making tool to determine whether or not youth should be placed in detention, released to an ATD or sent home with a court date.

 Automatic Holds Detained

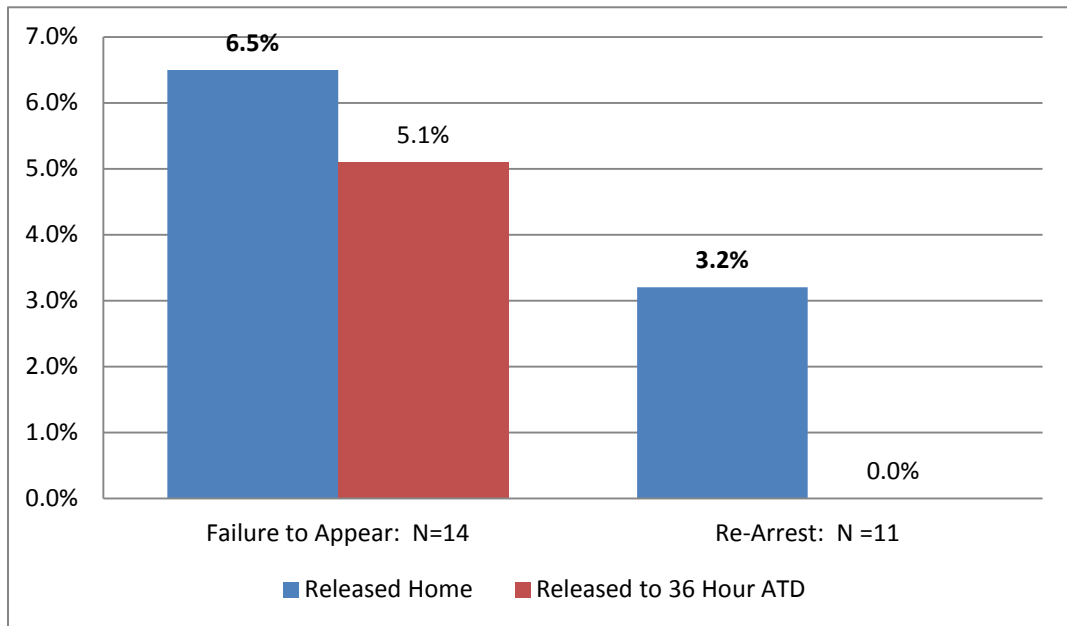


RAI Release Outcomes 2009*
