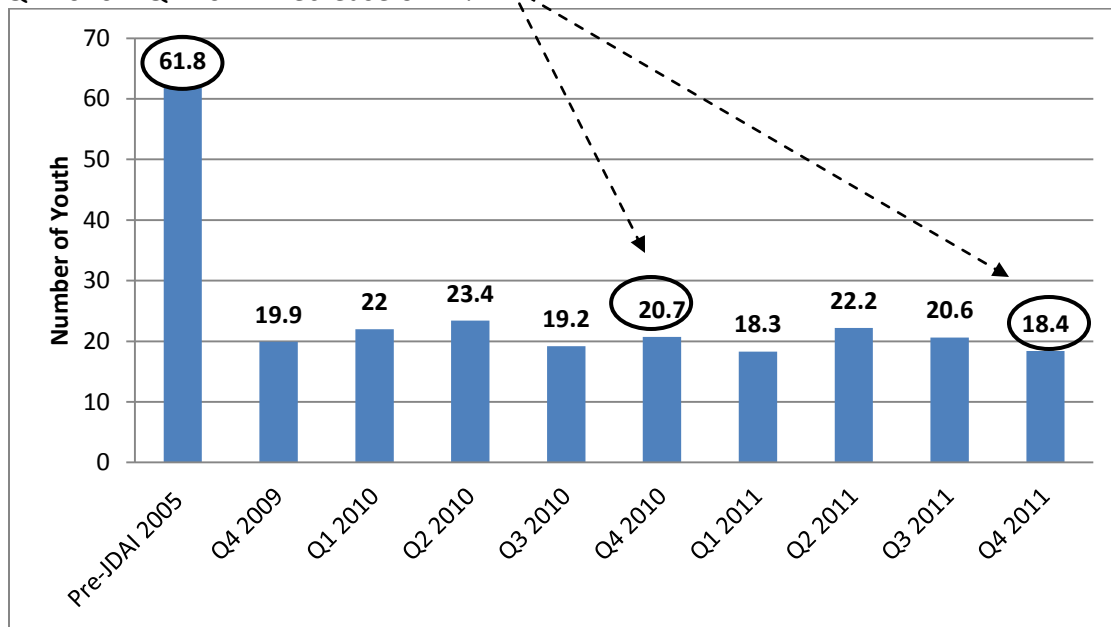

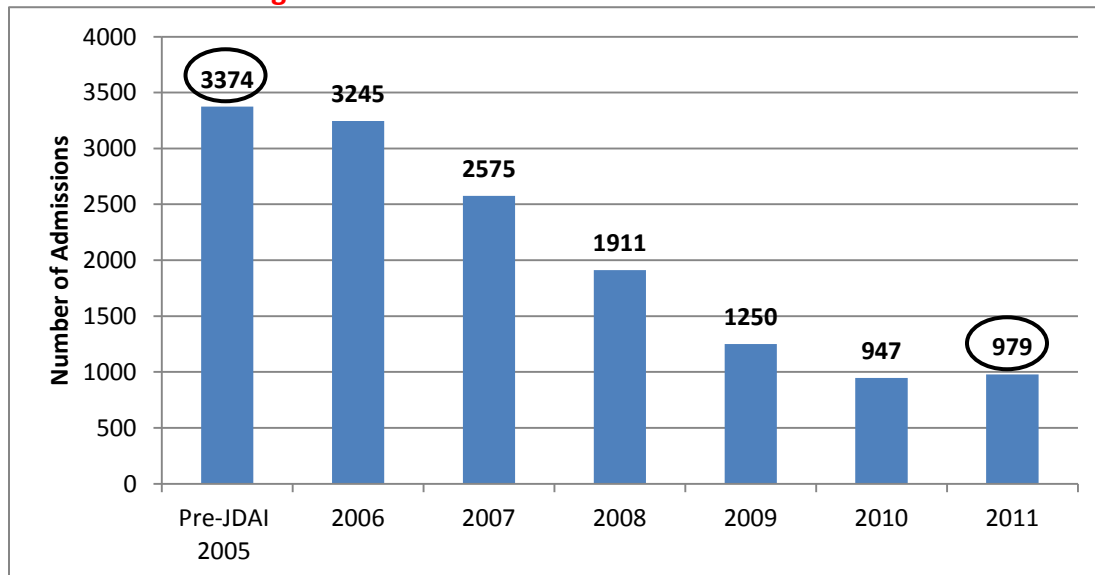

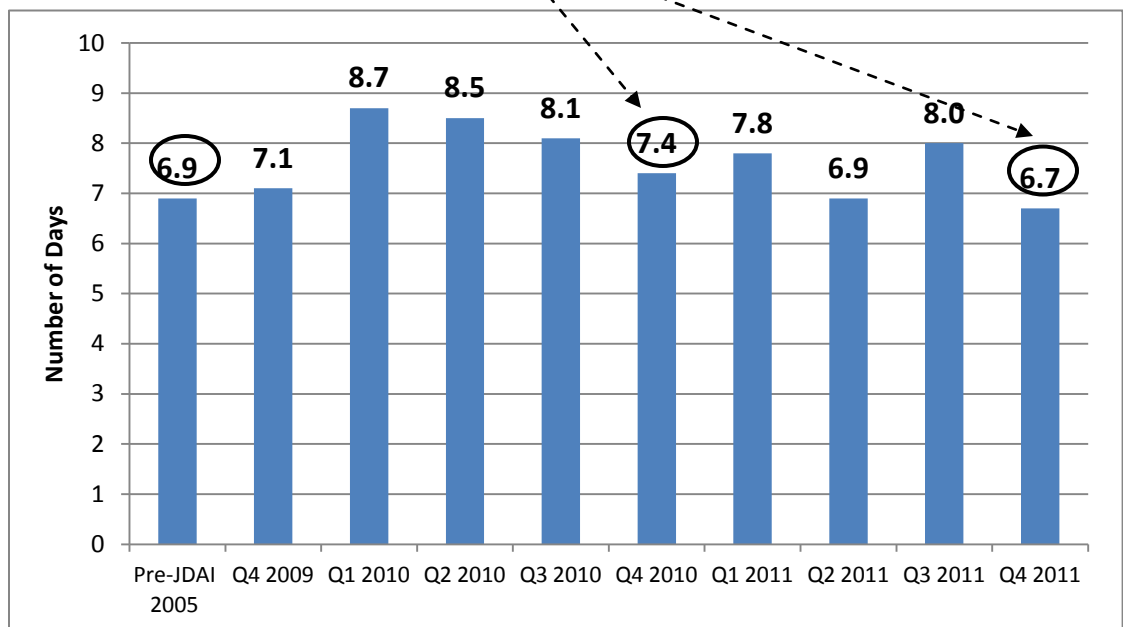
**Average Length of Stay in Detention, Number of Days**

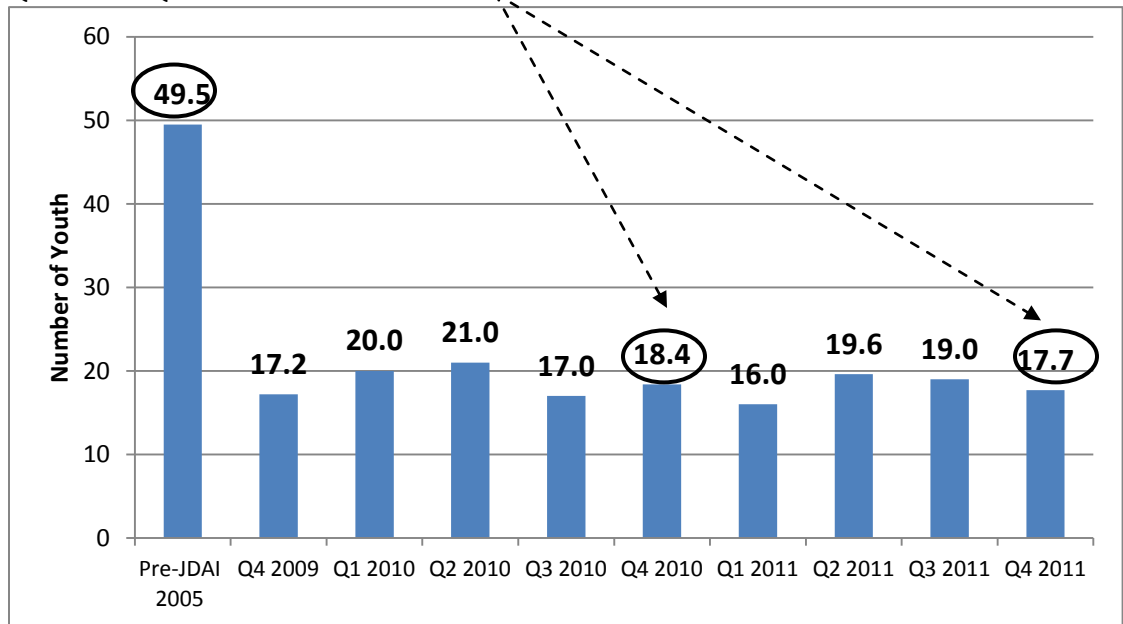

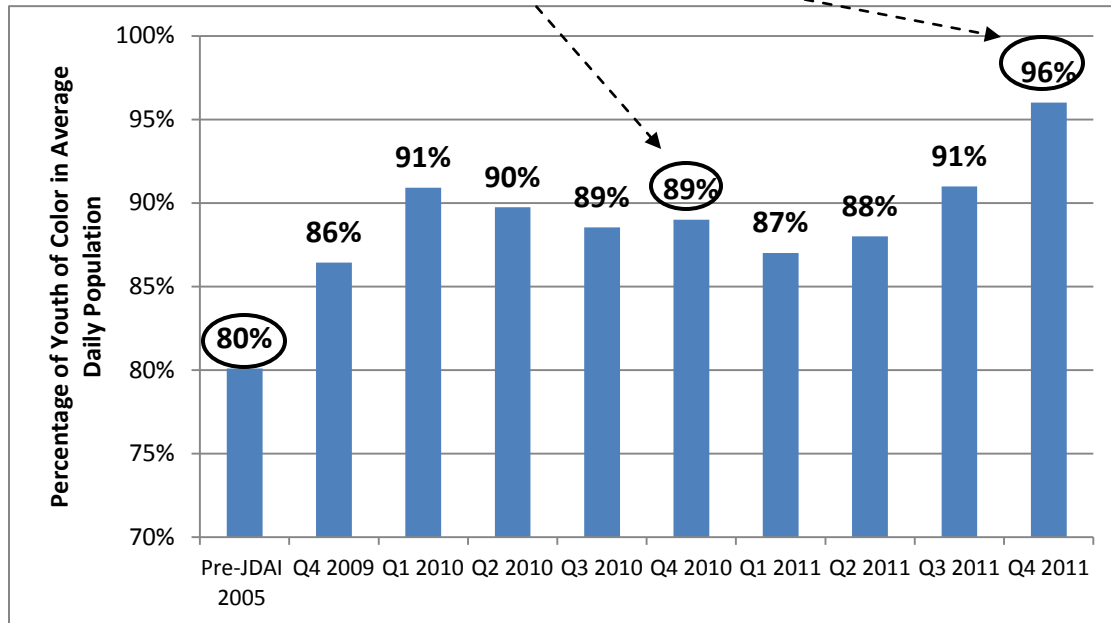
**Youth of Color as a Percentage of ADP in Detention,**

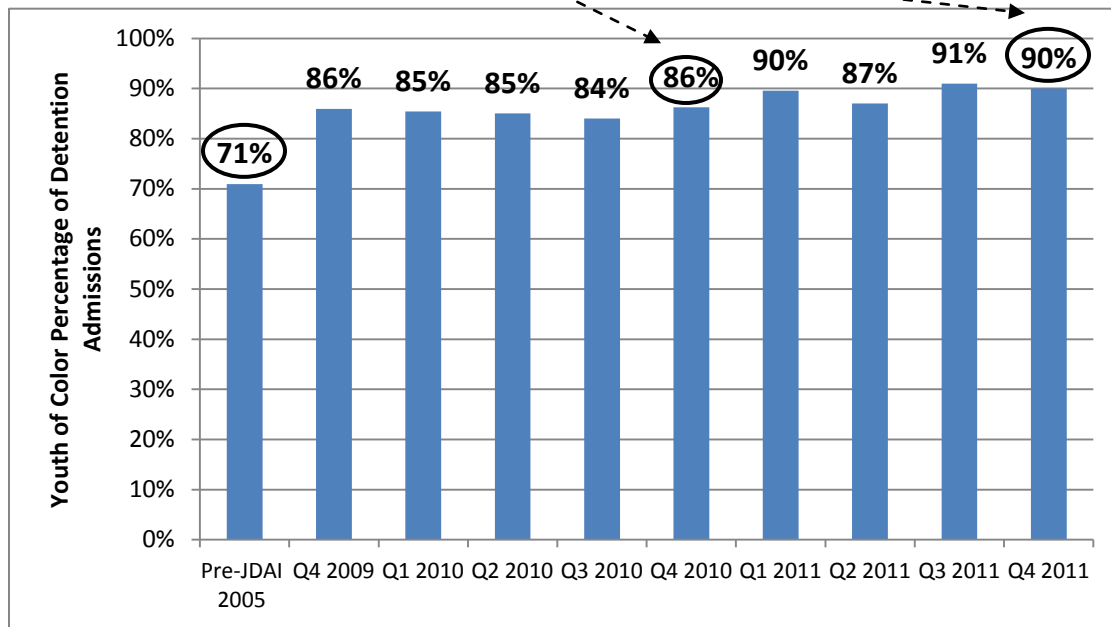

### Average Daily Population in JDC Facility, Number of Youth

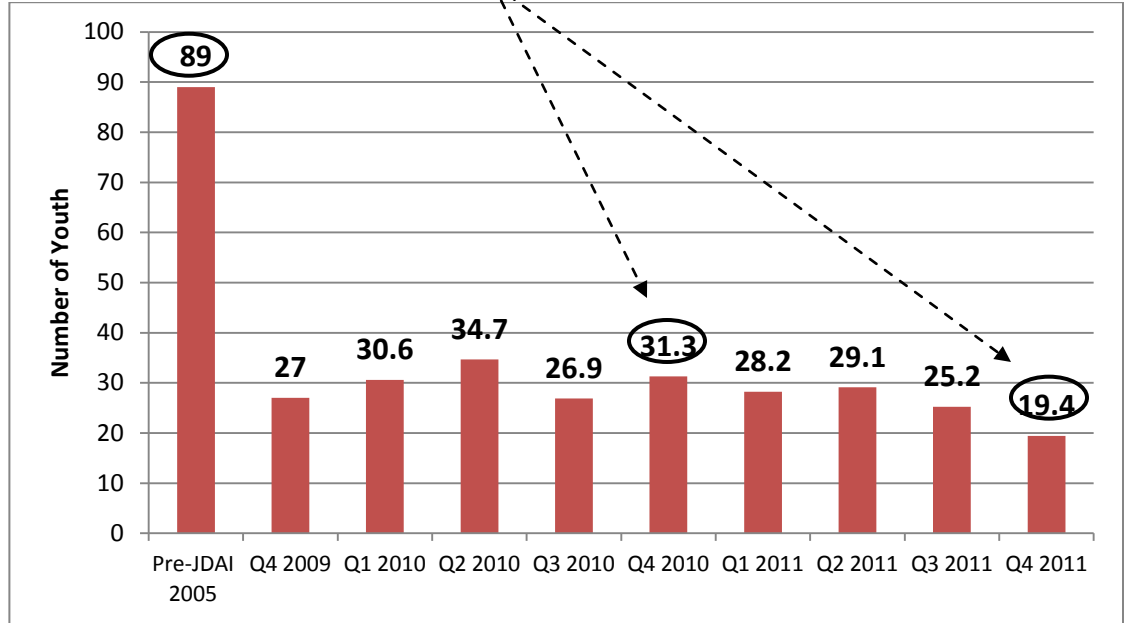
Pre-JDAI 2005 through Q4 2011: Decrease of 78%

\*The Boys Work Program was moved to Boys Totem Town in early March 2008 and was renamed the Recovery Program. Girls remain at JDC.

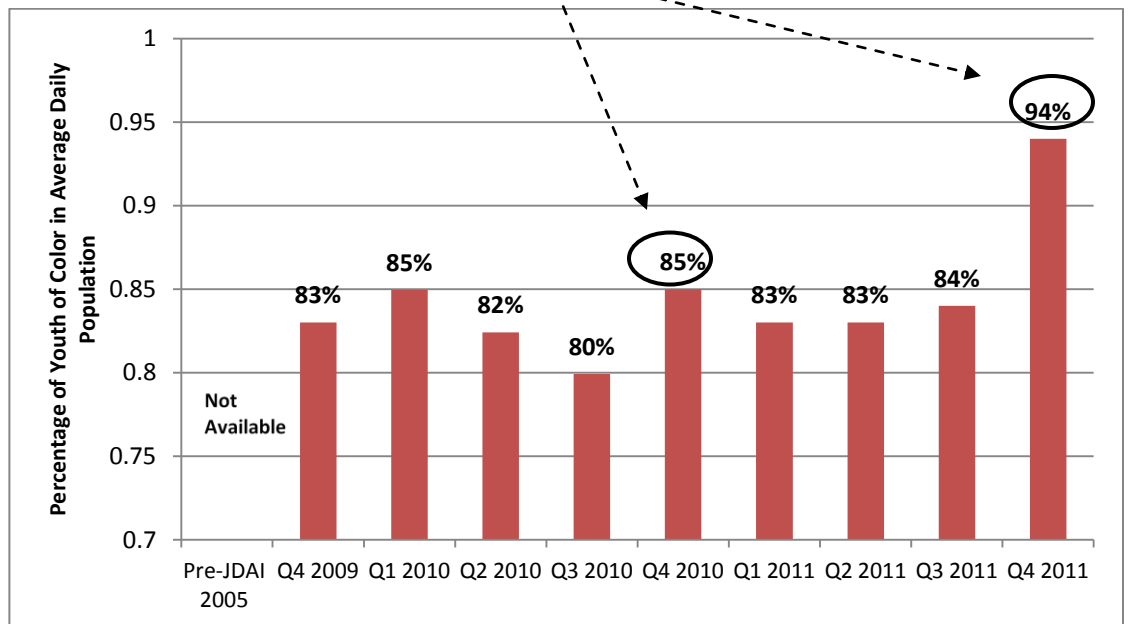


### Youth of Color as a Percentage of Average Daily Population in JDC Facility

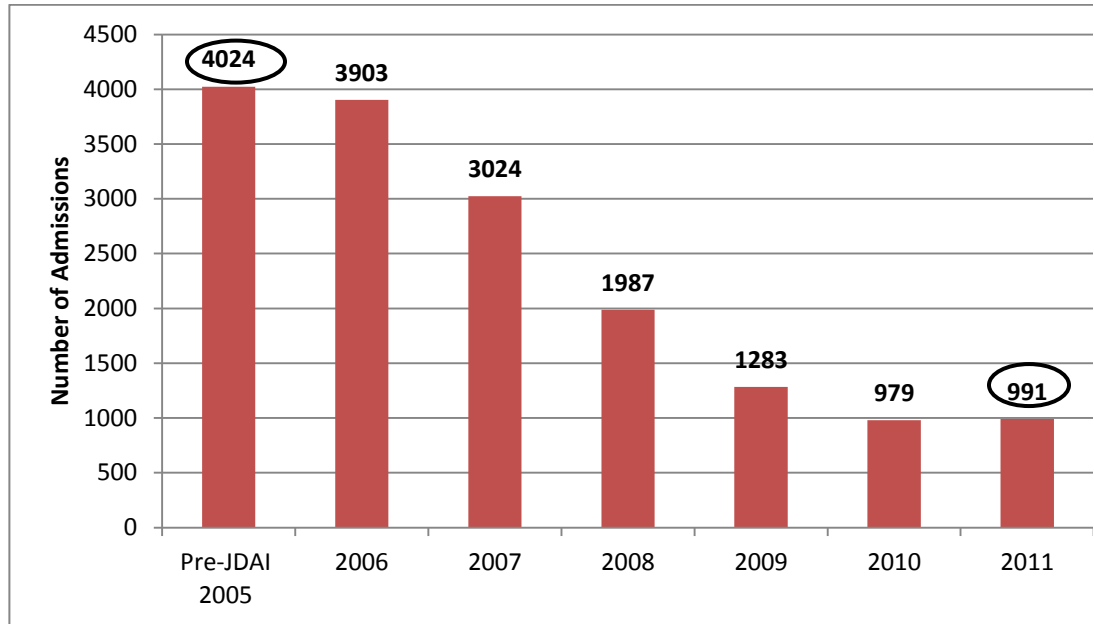


### Annual Admissions to JDC Facility

An admission into Detention immediately followed by an admission into the Work Program or QUEST Program is counted as two admissions.

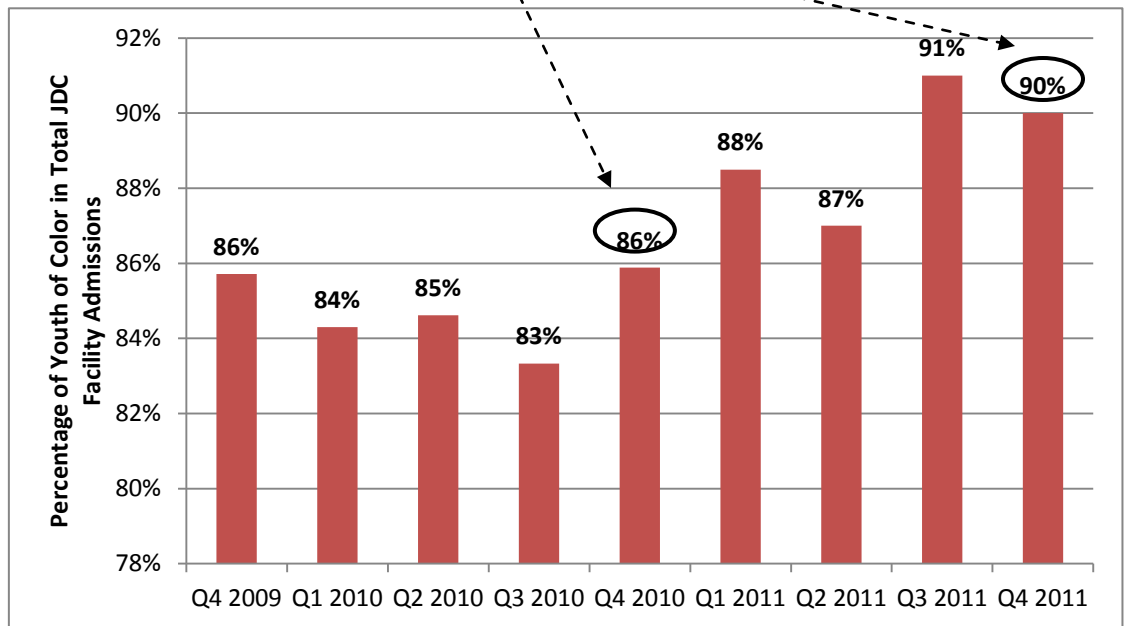


### Youth of Color Percentage of JDC Facility Admissions

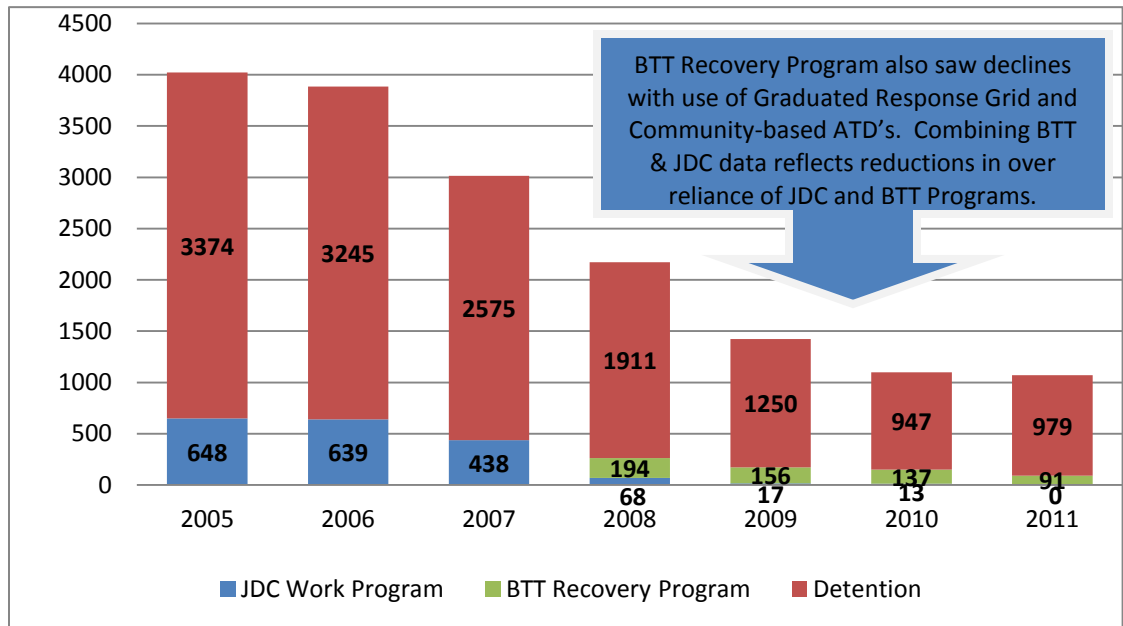

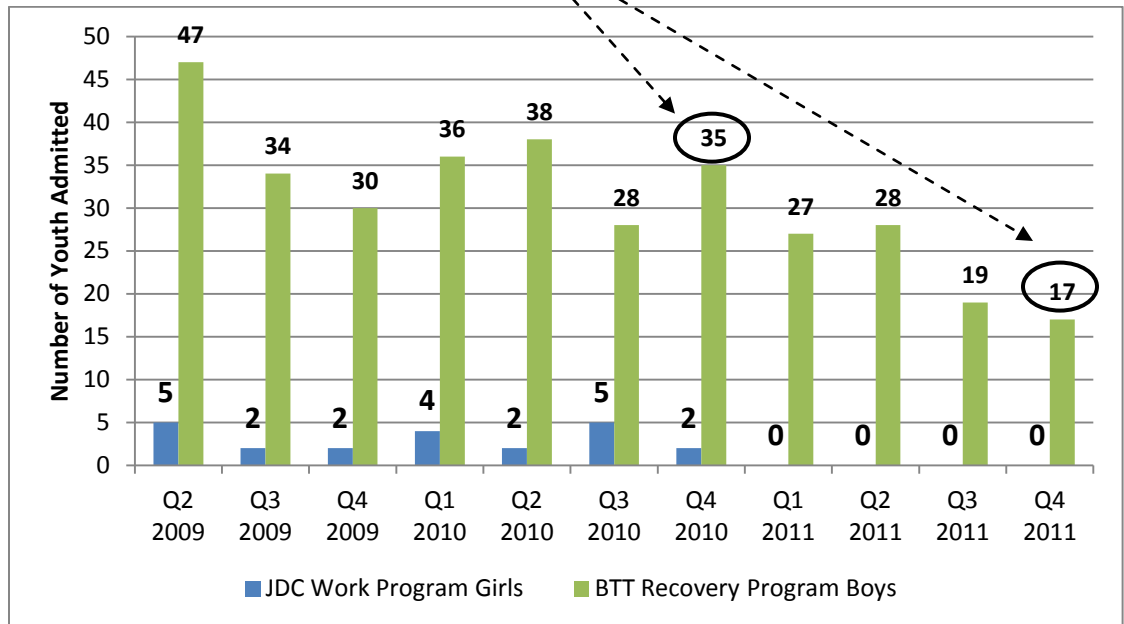




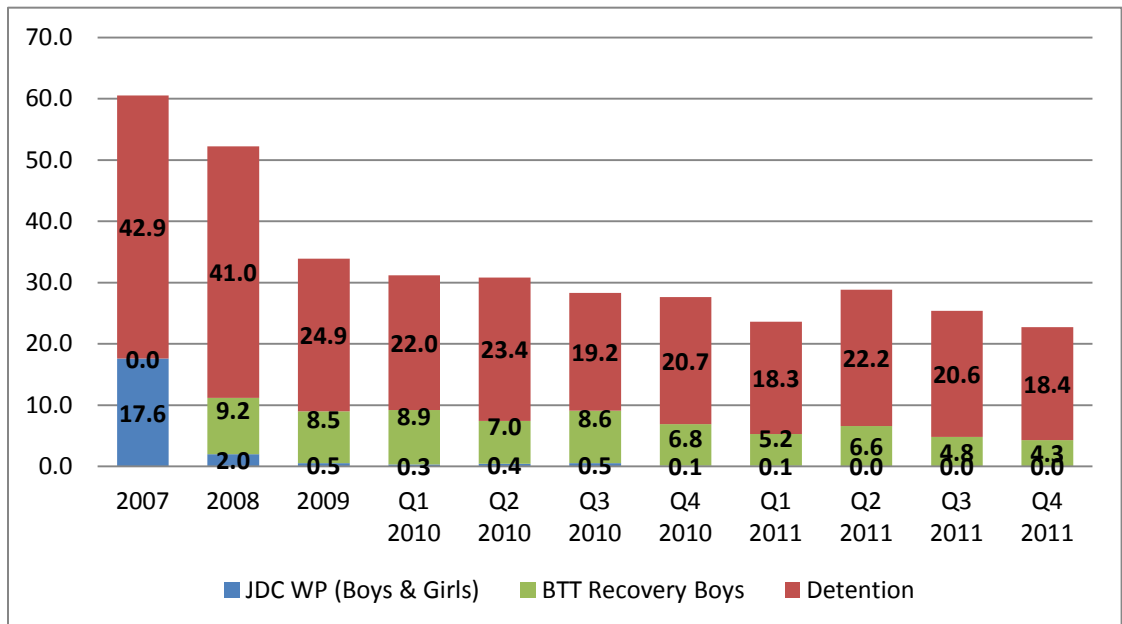
### Admissions by Program, Q2 2009 – Q4 2011

### Average Daily Population by Program, 2007 – Q4 2011

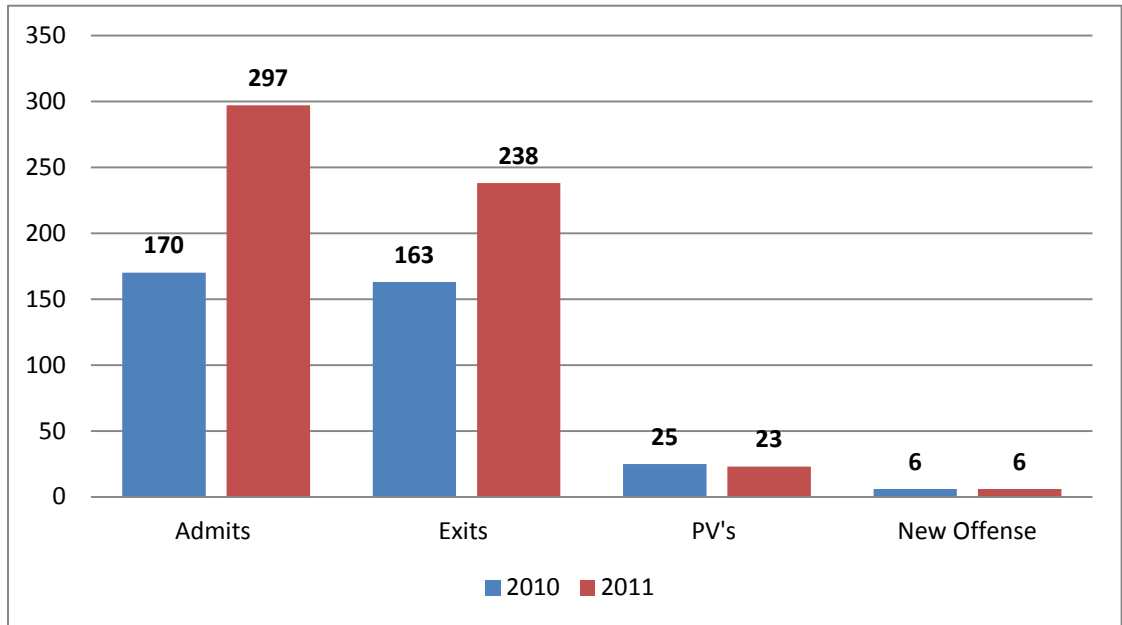

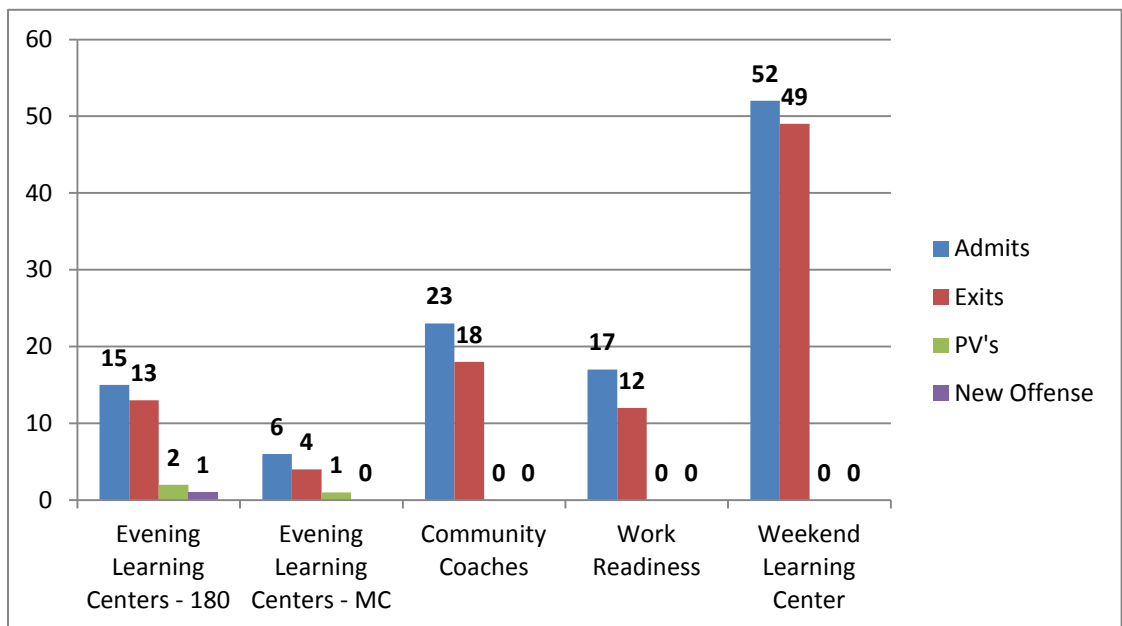
\*In June 2009, Evening Learning Centers (ELC) and Community Coaches (CC) were implemented for pre and post disposition.

\*In July 2011, Weekend Learning Center (WLC) was implemented.

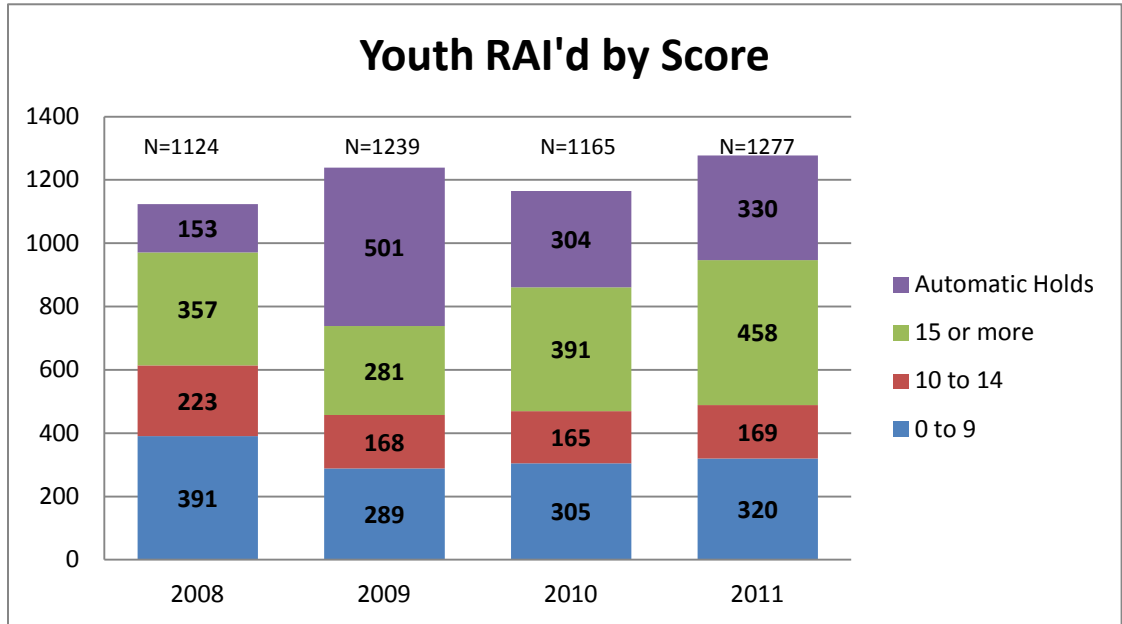


### Community Based Alternatives to Detention by ATD, Q3 2011



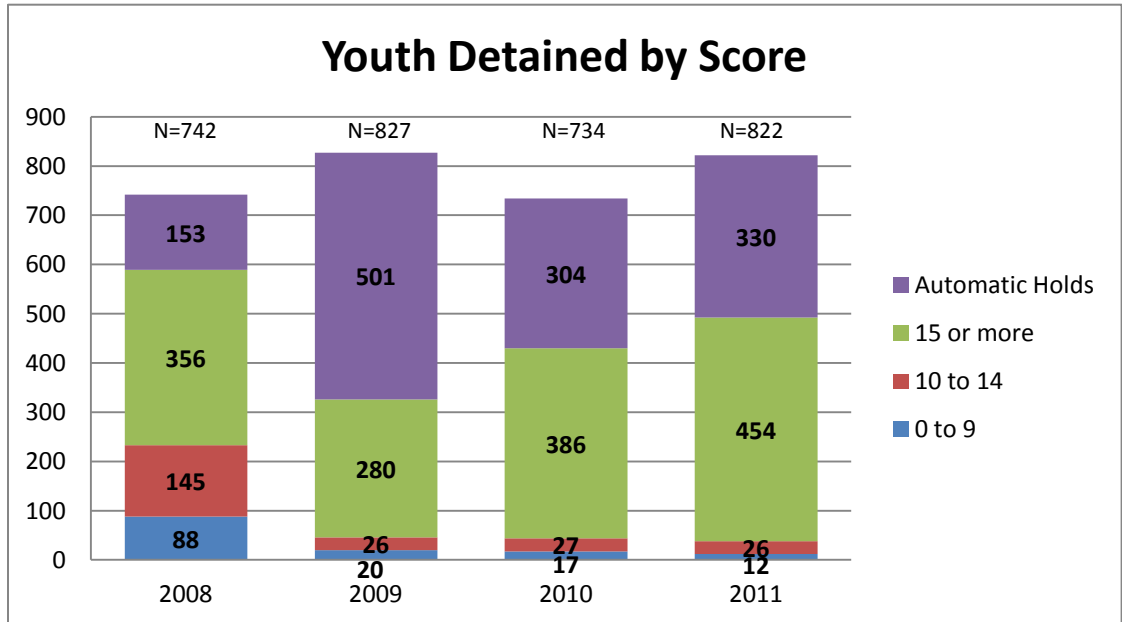
**RAI Data: 2008 – 2011 - Youth RAI'd by Score**

The Risk Assessment Instrument (RAI) is used as a decision-making tool to determine whether or not youth should be placed in detention, released to an ATD or sent home with a court date.

 Automatic Holds Detained

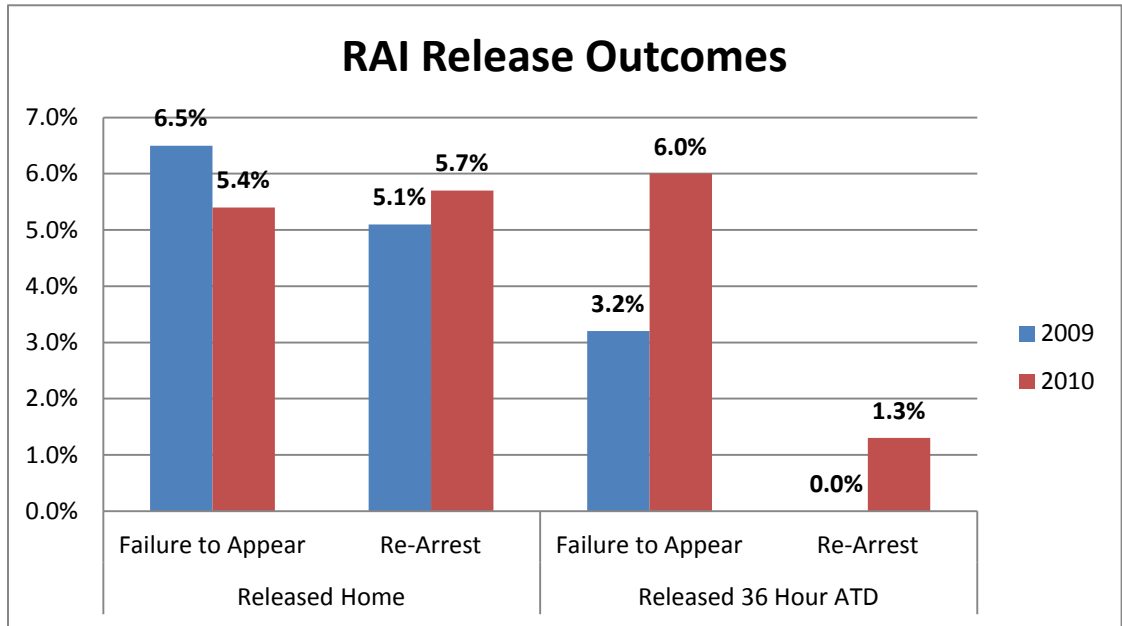


**RAI Release Outcomes 2009-2010**
