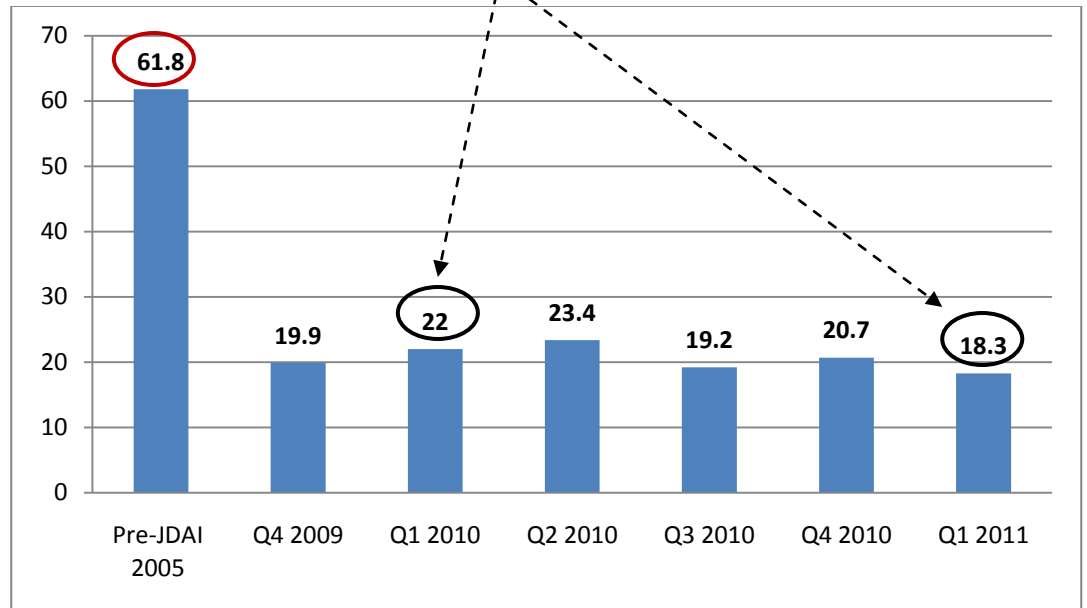

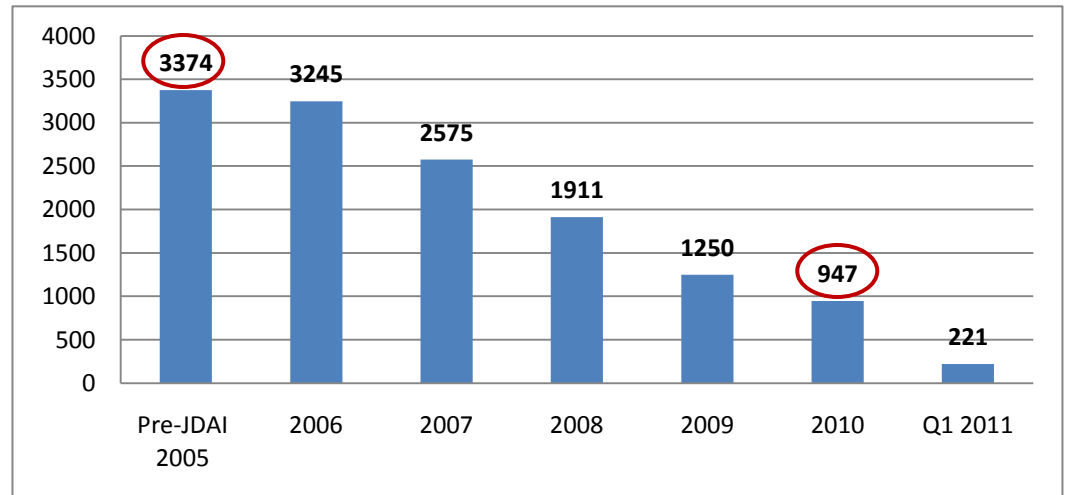
Average Daily Population of Juveniles in Detention (for Detention Status Juveniles only).

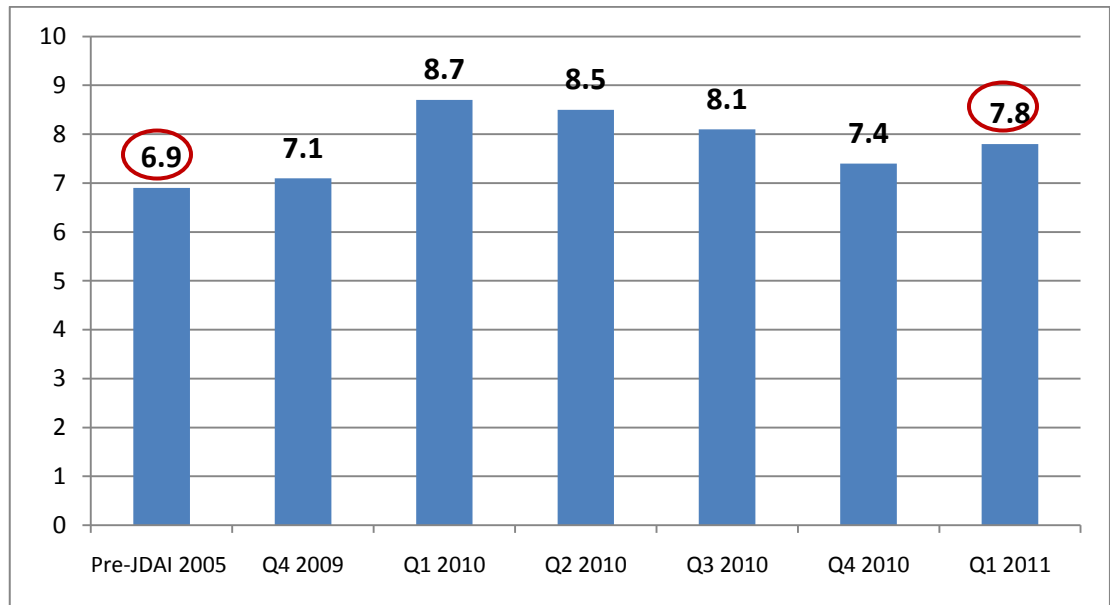

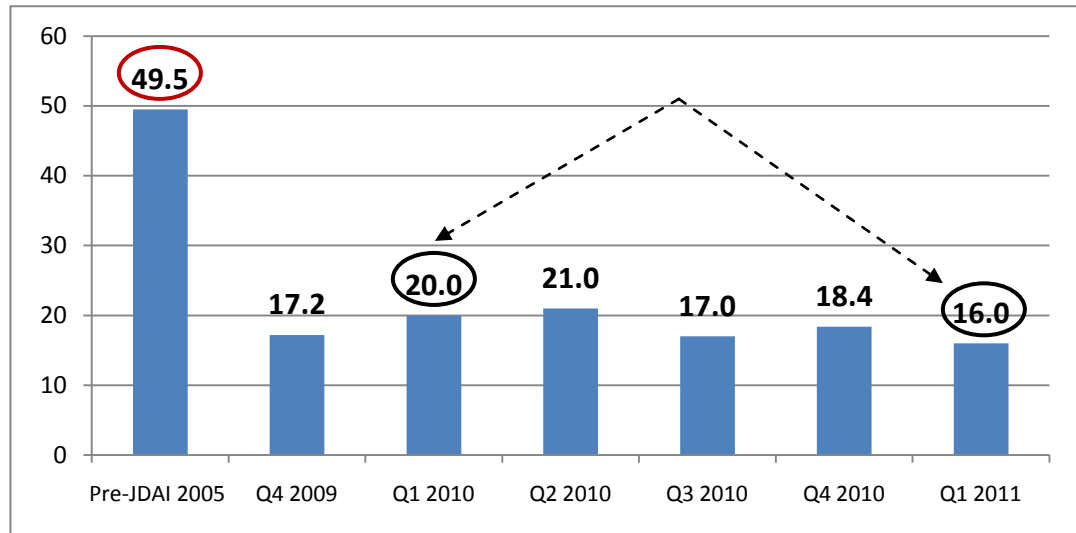

Average Daily Population of Youth of Color in Detention (for Detention Status Juveniles only).

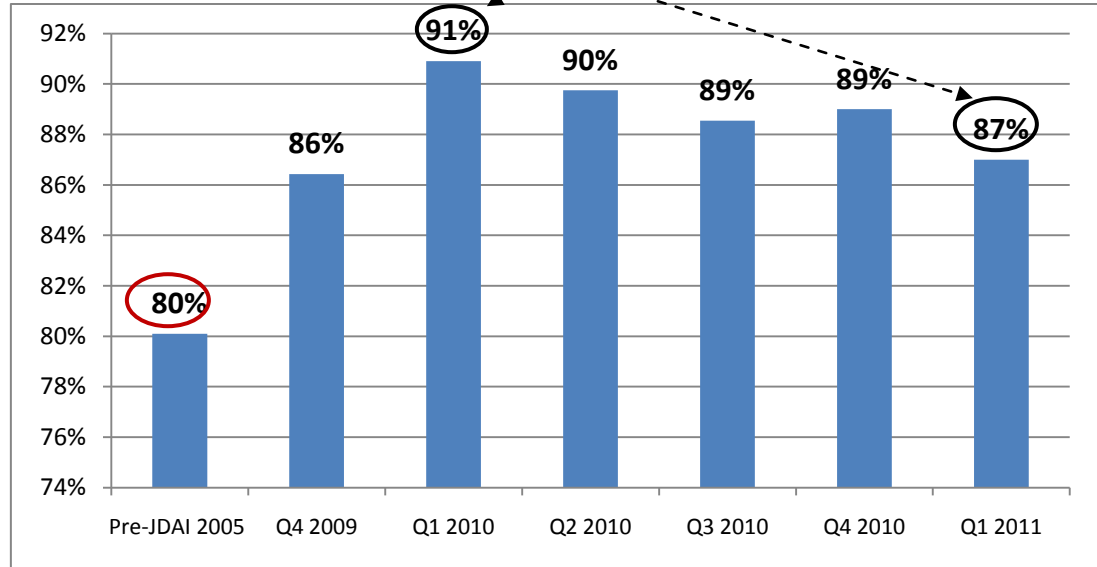


Youth of Color as a Percentage of ADP in Detention,

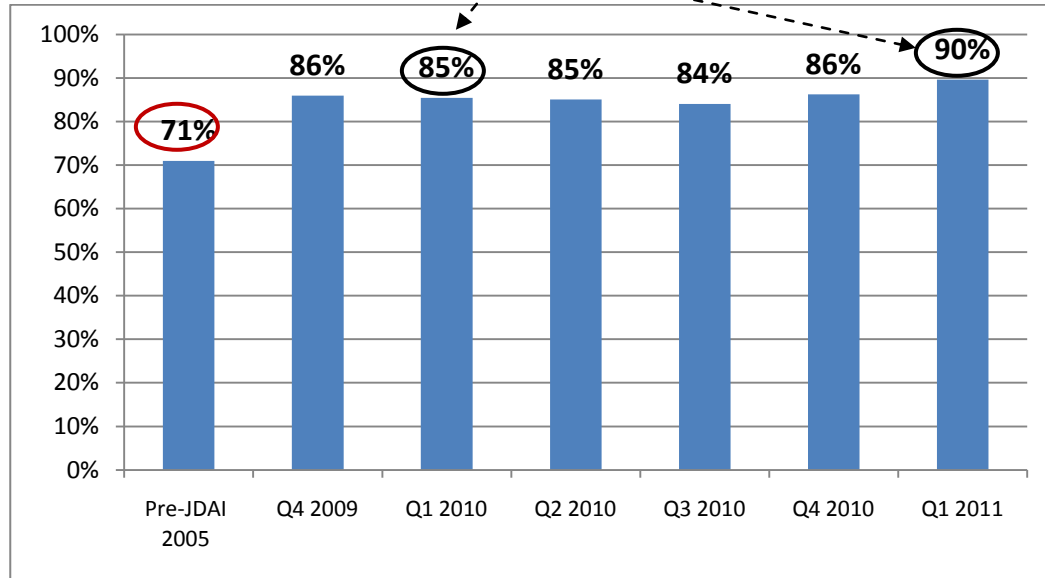
Youth of Color Percentage of Detention Admissions,

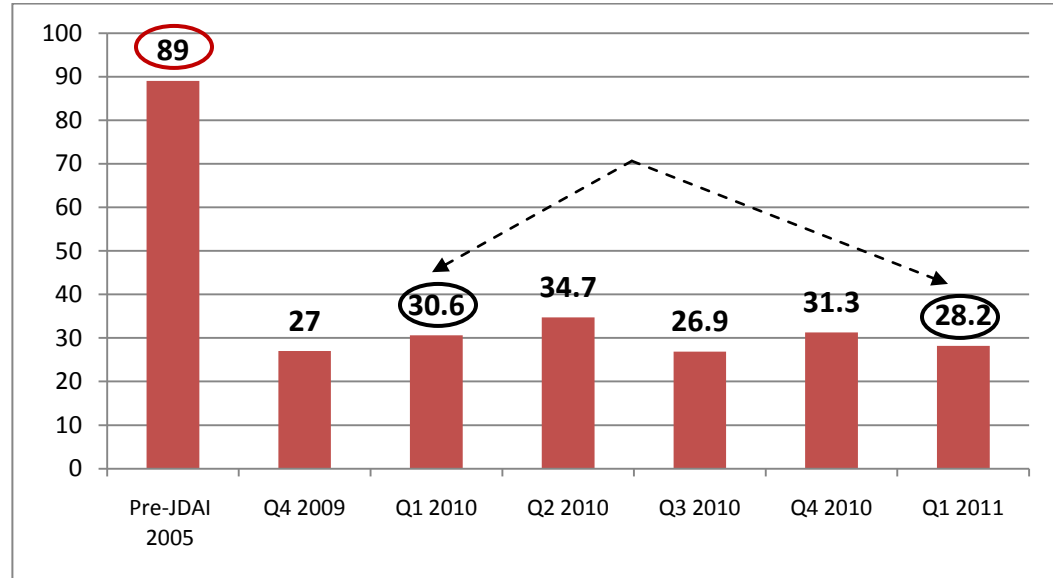

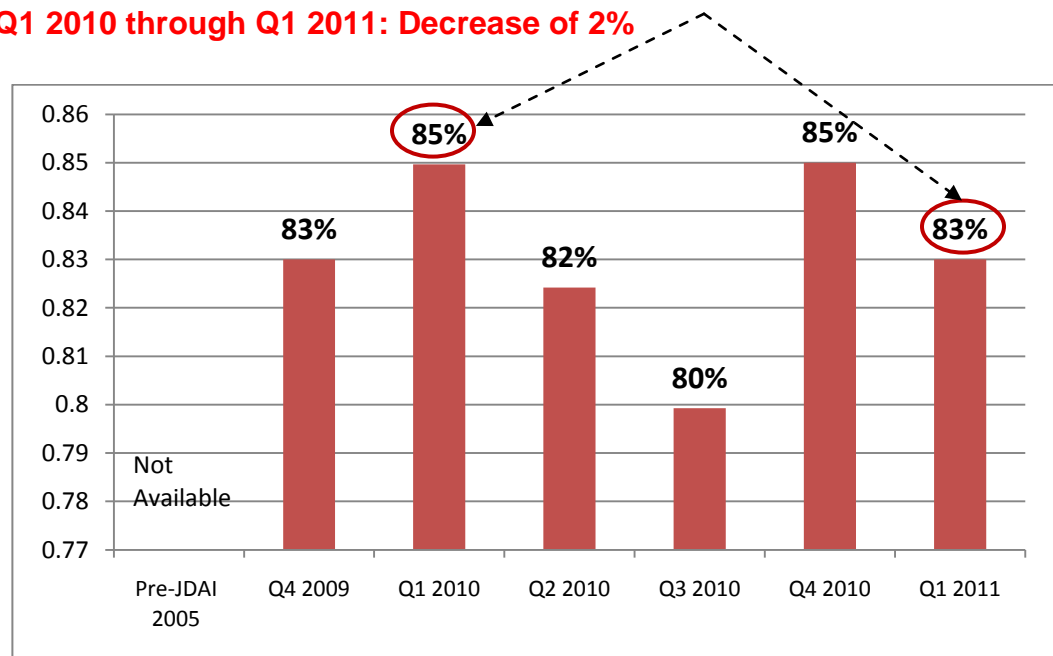


Youth of Color as a Percentage of Average Daily Population in JDC Facility

Youth of Color Percentage of Overall ADP in JDC Facility.

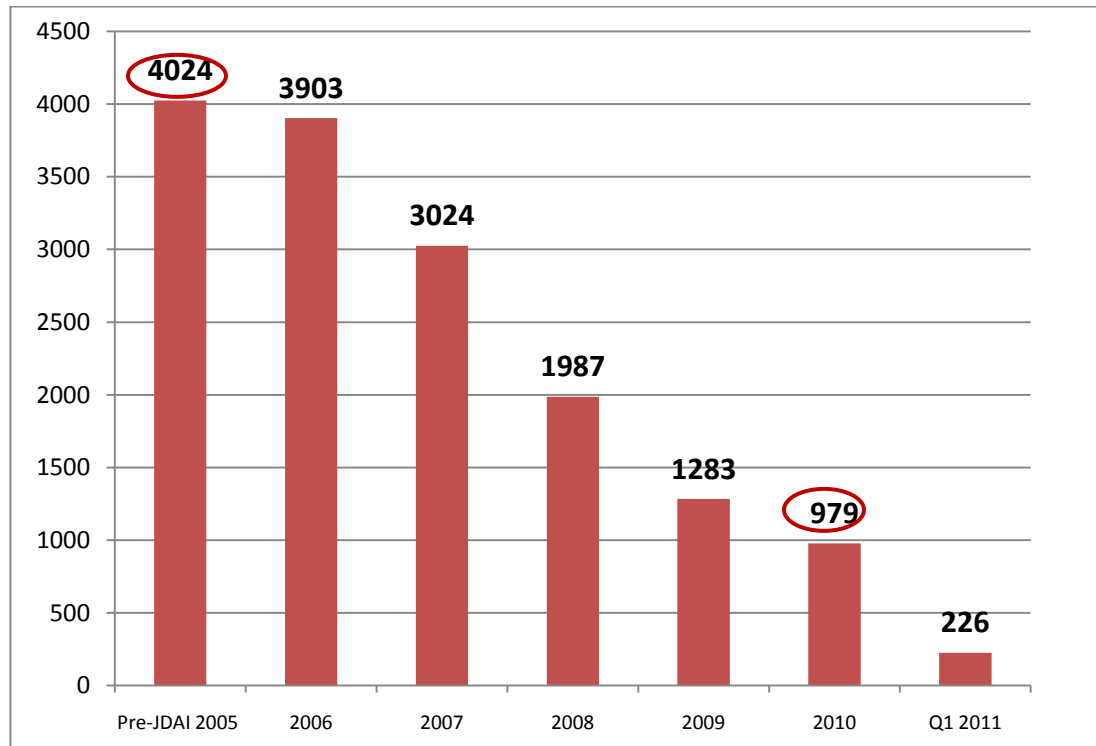

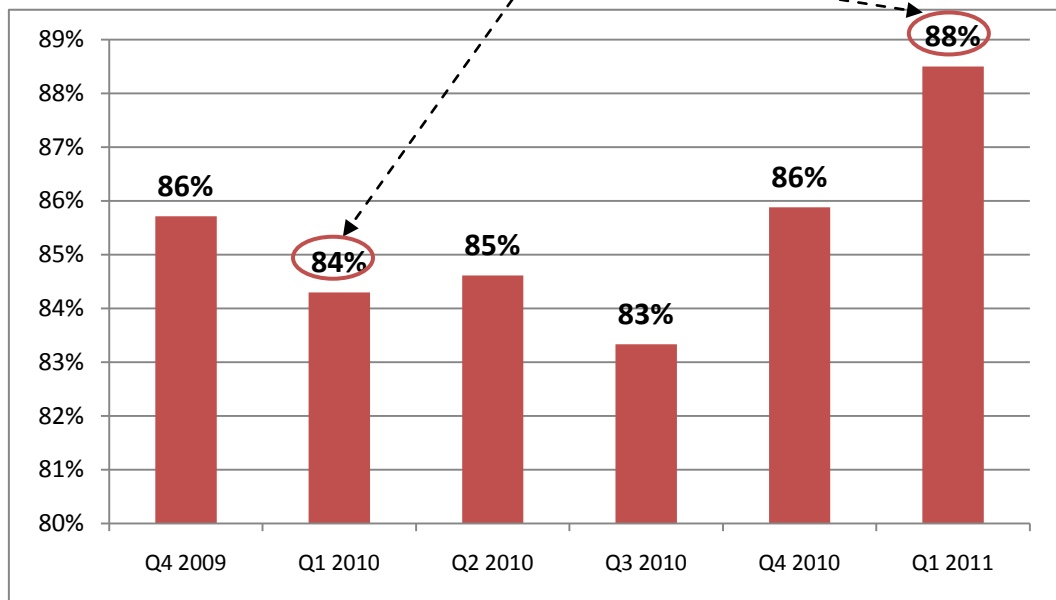

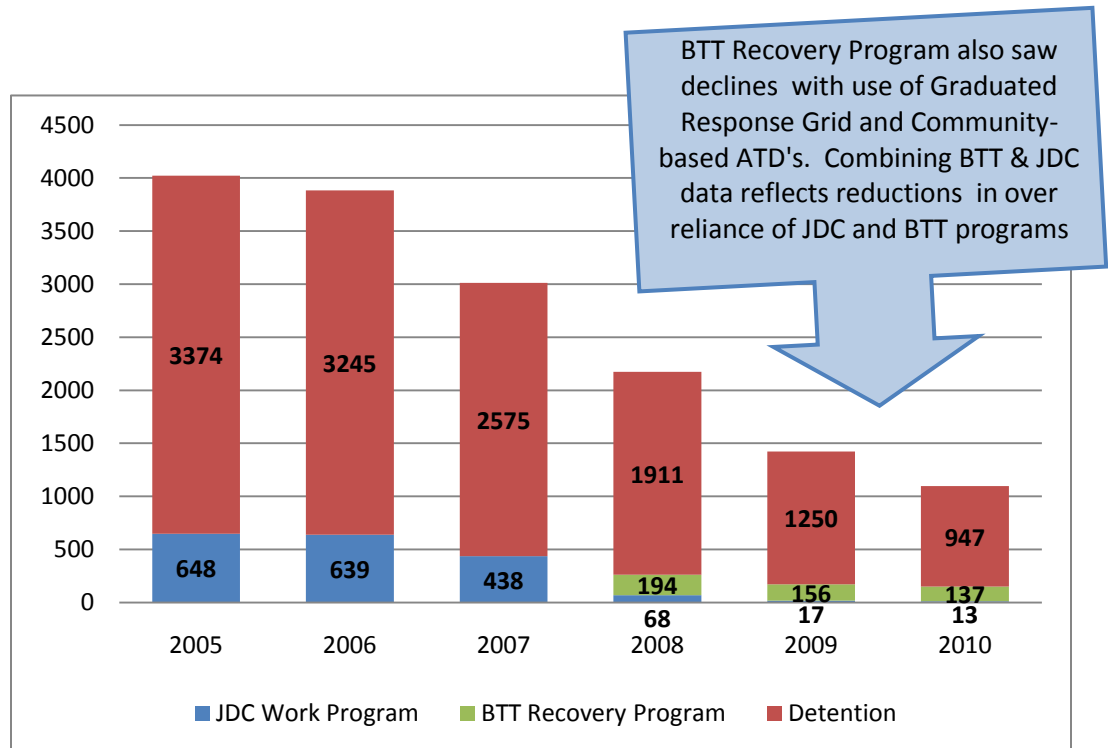

Program Admissions, 2005 - 2010

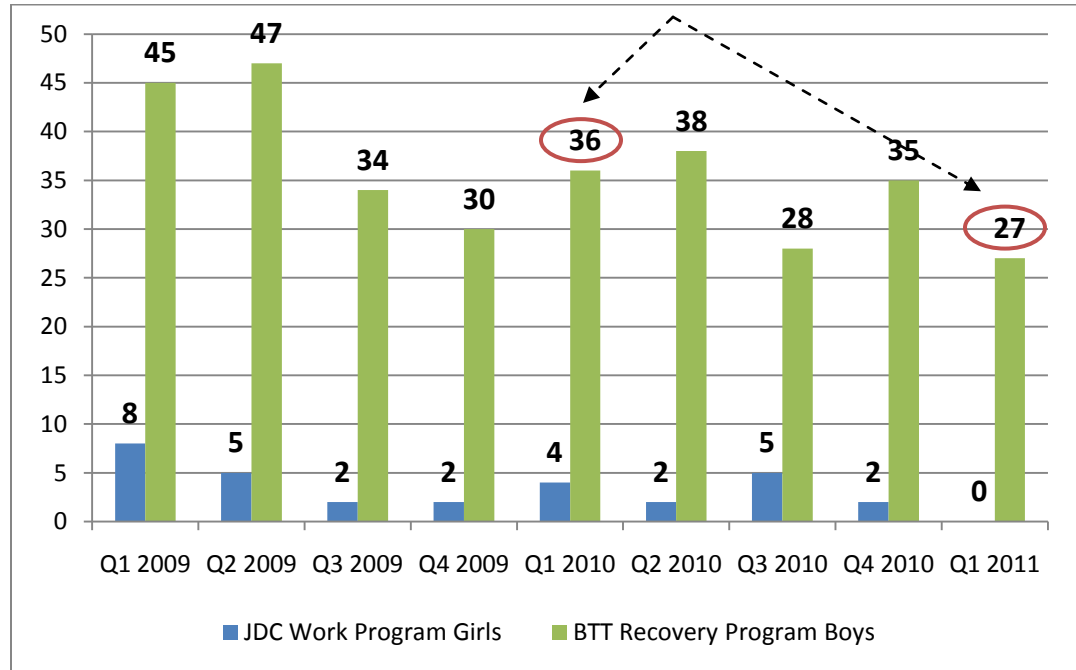

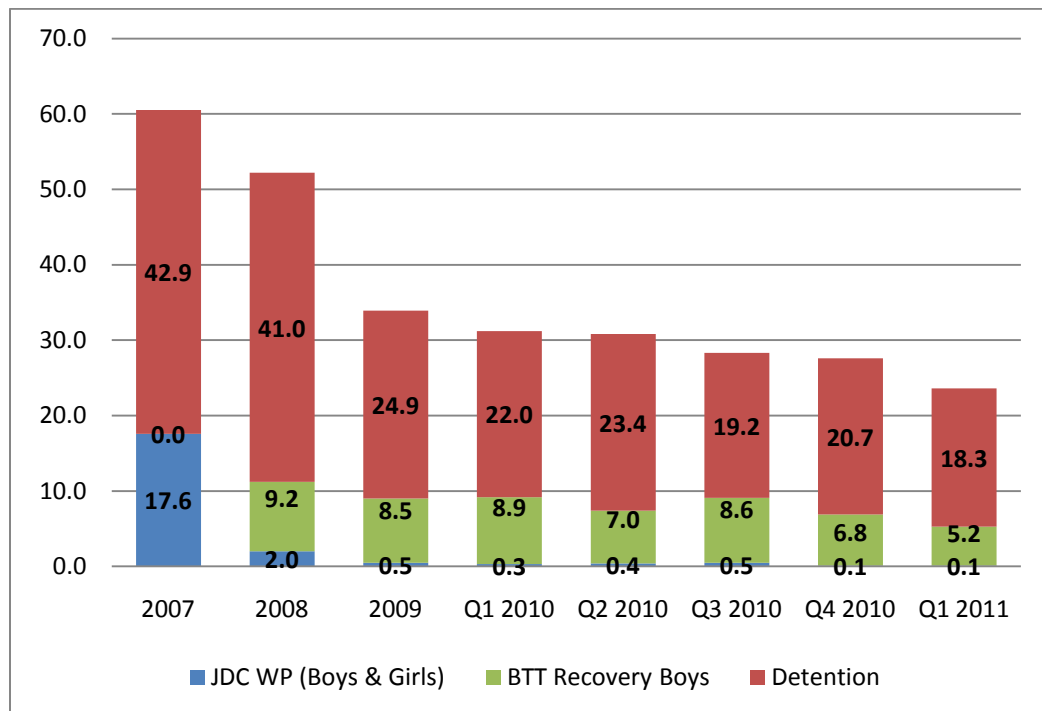
Admissions by Program, Q1 2009 – Q1 2011

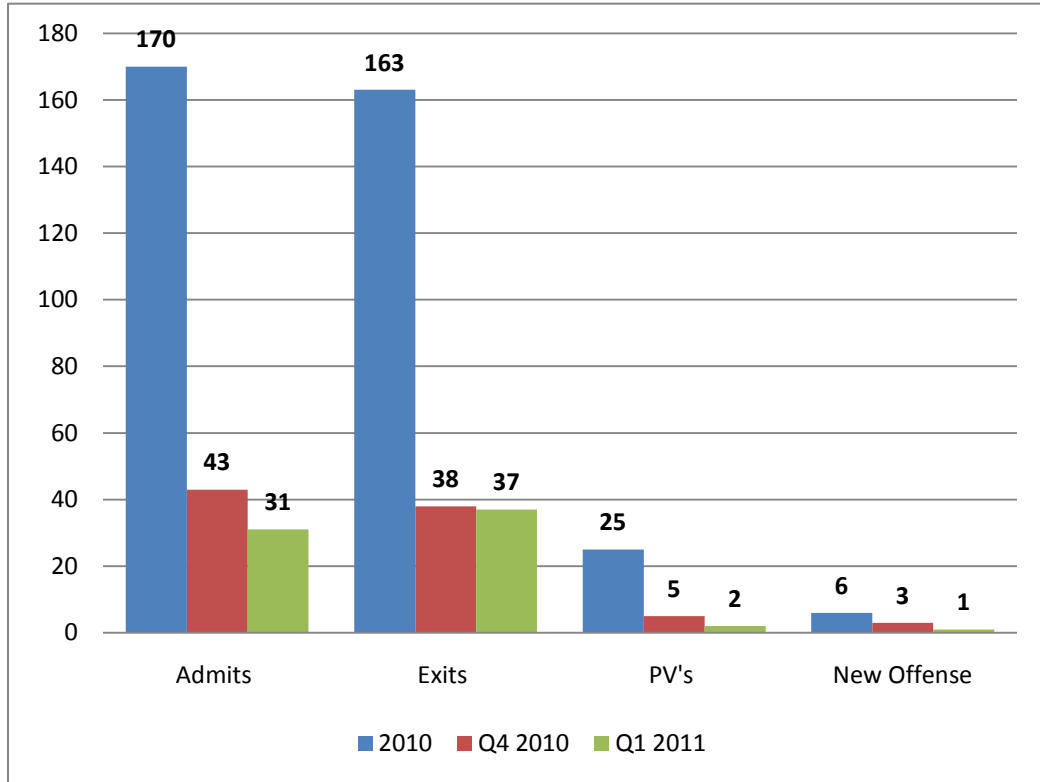


Average Daily Population by Program, 2007 – Q1 2011



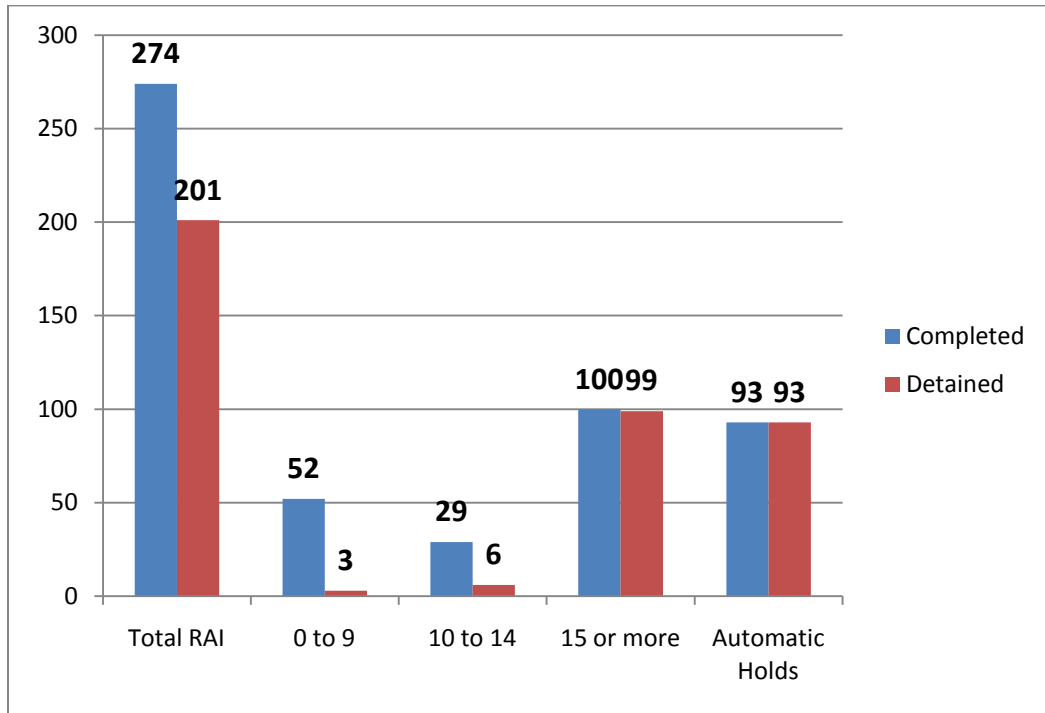
Community Based Alternatives to Detention, 2010 – Q1 2011

*In June 2009, Evening Learning Centers (ELC) and Community Coaches (CC) implemented for pre and post disposition



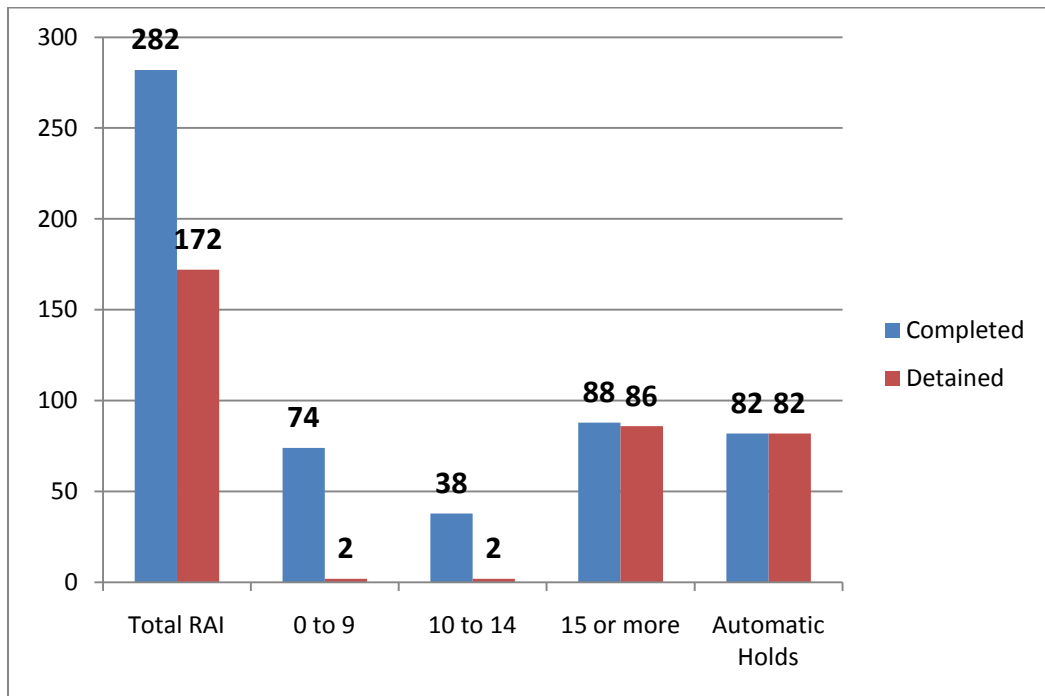
RAI Data: Q4 2010 Override Rate = 11%

 Automatic Holds Detained

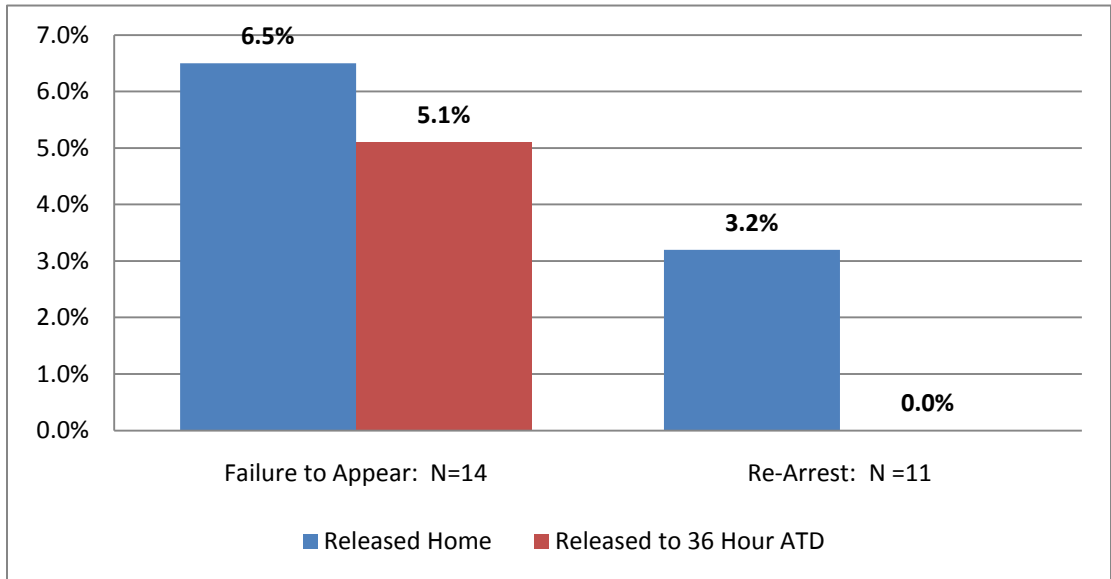


RAI Release Outcomes 2009*

Report Notes:

Radius Program numbers are included in the Detention numbers throughout this report. Radius is a program for girls. The program had 12 admits in 2007; 27 admit in 2008; and 15 admits in 2009.

The Boys Work Program was moved from the Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) to Boys Totem Town (BTT) in early March 2008 and was renamed The Recovery Program. Girls are remaining at JDC.

Community Coaches and Evening Learning Centers outcome results included. These community based alternatives were implemented in June 2009.
