










### Youth of Color as a Percentage of ADP in Detention,



Admissions to Detention by Race and Latino Ethnicity with any Race (for Detention Status Juveniles only).









## Youth of Color Percentage of JDC Facility Admissions Q4 2009 - Q4 2010: Flat





### Program Admissions, 2005 - 2010





### Average Daily Population by Program, 2007 – Q4 2010






### **Community Based Alternatives to Detention, Q4 2010**



RAI: Quarter 4 2010 Override Rate: 11%



The Boys Work Program was moved from the Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) to Boys Totem Town (BTT) in early March 2008 and was renamed The Recovery Program. Girls are remaining at JDC.
